## Crusaders

A group would then get together and visit the church. Eventually a campus ministry was formed in order to preserve this tradition. Over the years this ministry has been called by many names including "Living Witness" and "MOT" (Ministry Outreach Teams).

This year we changed the name to "Crusaders" and we branched out in our ministry. Along with churches, we also ministered to prisons, a homeless shelter, and "Mercy Ministries," a rehabilitation center for young women.

Our focus verse this year was Isaiah 6:8: "Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' And I said, 'Here am I; Send me!'" We think that this verse sums up the life of a Christian believer. When one is saved and sanctified by the love and the grace of God, the natural response to His will for us is "Send me!"

Volume number 75 of the Trevecca Nazarene University Darda was printed by Josten's Printing and Publishing Company located in Clarksville, Tennessee. A total of 650 books were printed. The cost of the book to students is covered in the general fee which the student pays at the beginning of each semester. Each student is entitled to a book if he or she has attended both the fall and spring semesters consecutively.
