Millard C. Reed exemplifies the “pastor’s heart,” and that fact is no surprise. He grew up in a parsonage and then spent his working years in ministry settings—from 1951 to 1991 in churches and then from 1991 to 2005 as the president-pastor of Trevecca. Serving and loving others has always been central to his calling—wherever that call led him. He was the pastor of churches in Oregon and St. Louis, Missouri; Kenosha, Wisconsin; Overland Park, Kansas; and Nashville, Tennessee. In 1991 he was elected president of Trevecca, and the college and its people became the focus of his pastor’s heart.

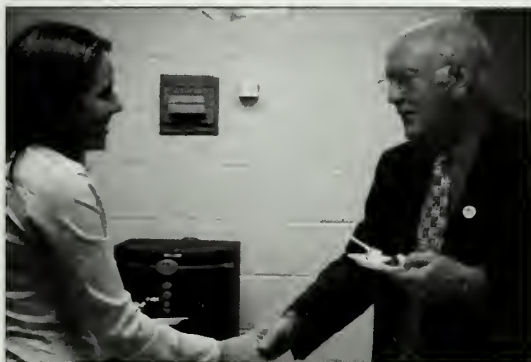

Under his leadership Trevecca began a transformation that included significant accomplishments:

- Unfunded scholarship assistance increased from \$0.6 million to \$4.84 million
- Increased the number of students participating in intercollegiate athletics to 140
- Increase of average ACT score of incoming freshmen to 21.9
- The change to Trevecca Nazarene *University*
- The construction of a new entry to Trevecca
- The addition of a doctoral program in education
- The completion of the largest capital campaign in the history of Trevecca (and also for any other Nazarene institution)
 - The construction of Waggoner Library
 - The largest enrollment in Trevecca history (2,089 in 2004)

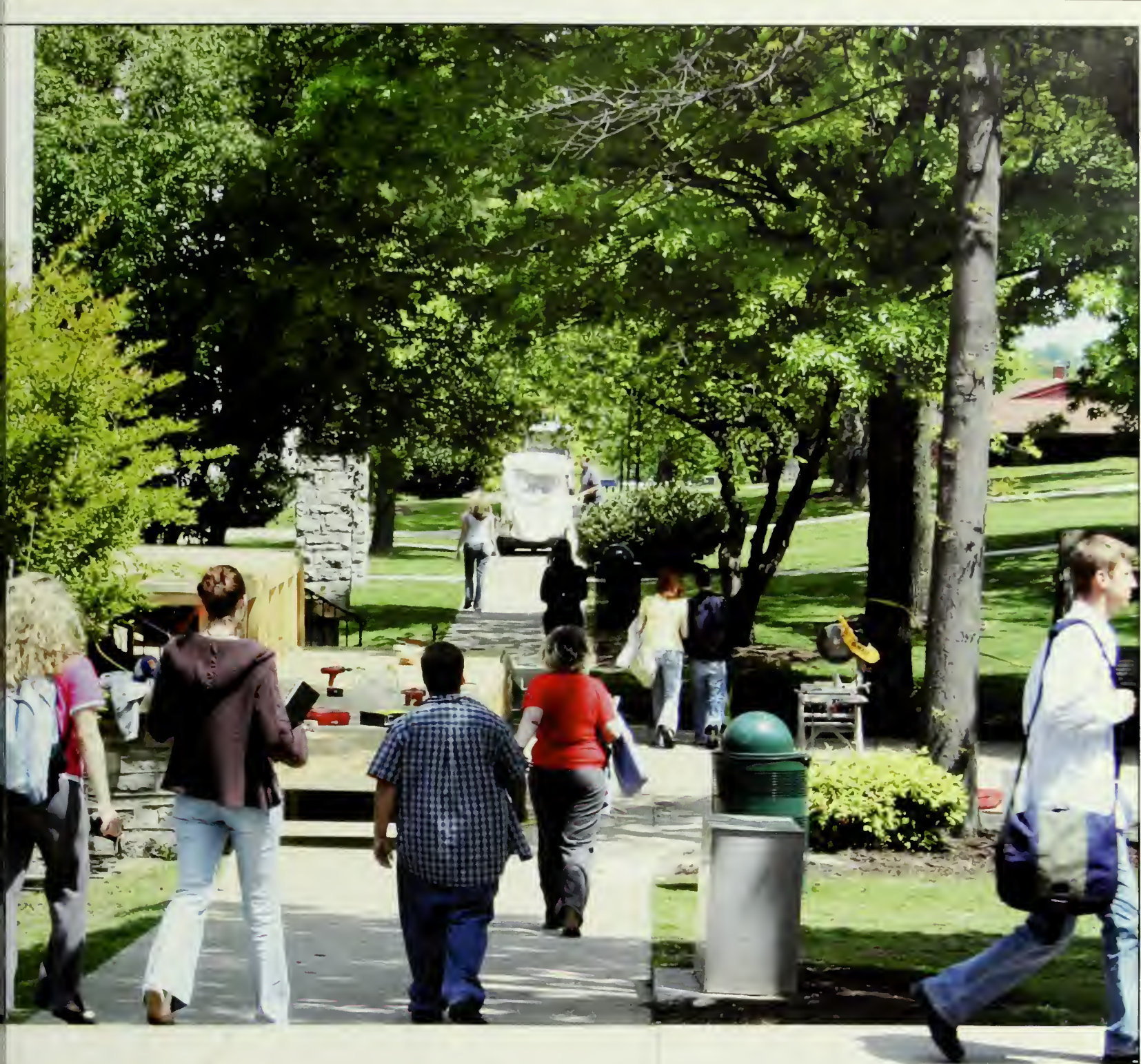

Echoing the words of Mother Teresa, Fry challenged her listeners: “Let’s do something beautiful for God.”

The Homecoming Parade, sponsored by the sophomore class, included more than forty floats and entries, including submissions from local ministries and businesses along Murfreesboro Road. This year’s grand marshal, President Millard Reed, descended on the parade route by helicopter and then chose to ride on the Johnson Hall float—a favor to his granddaughter, who lives in Johnson. 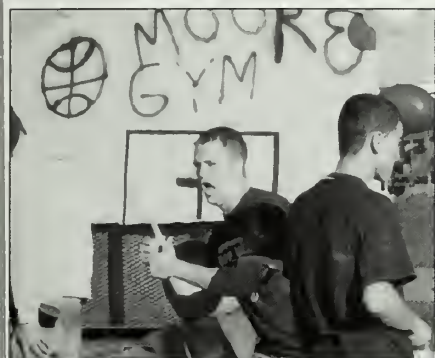

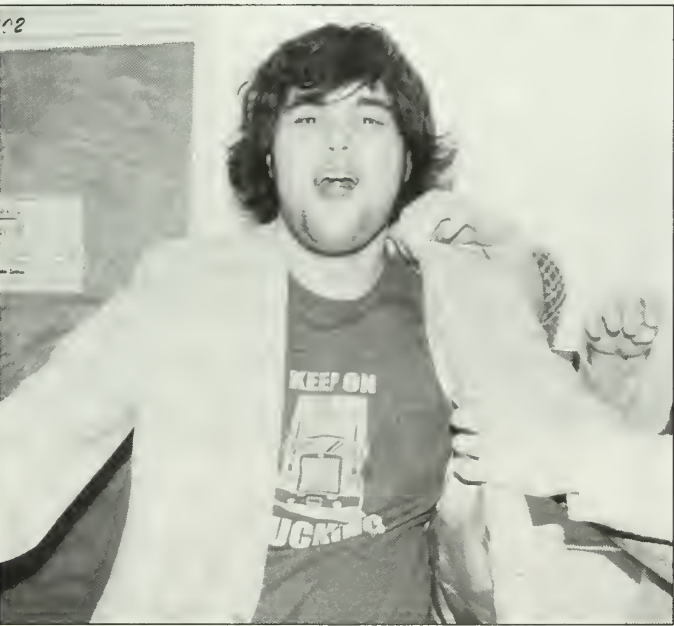

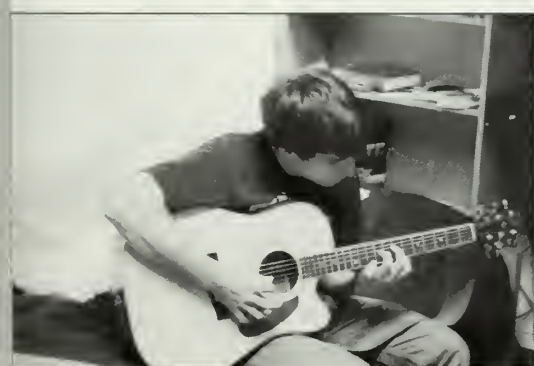

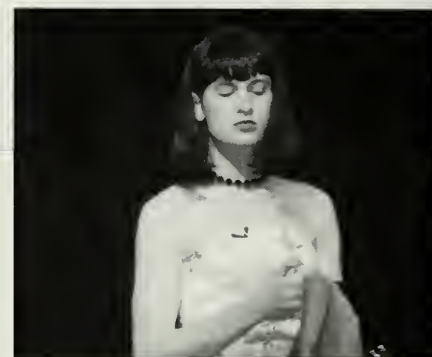

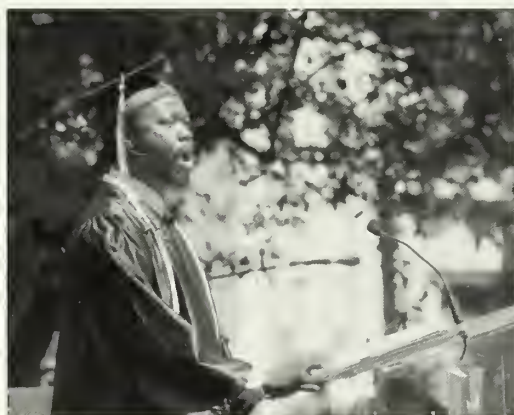

Collective individuality is a very important part of spiritual life. While each of us students has our own beliefs and leanings, at the same time we can come together at Trevecca to be ministered to and to minister to others. 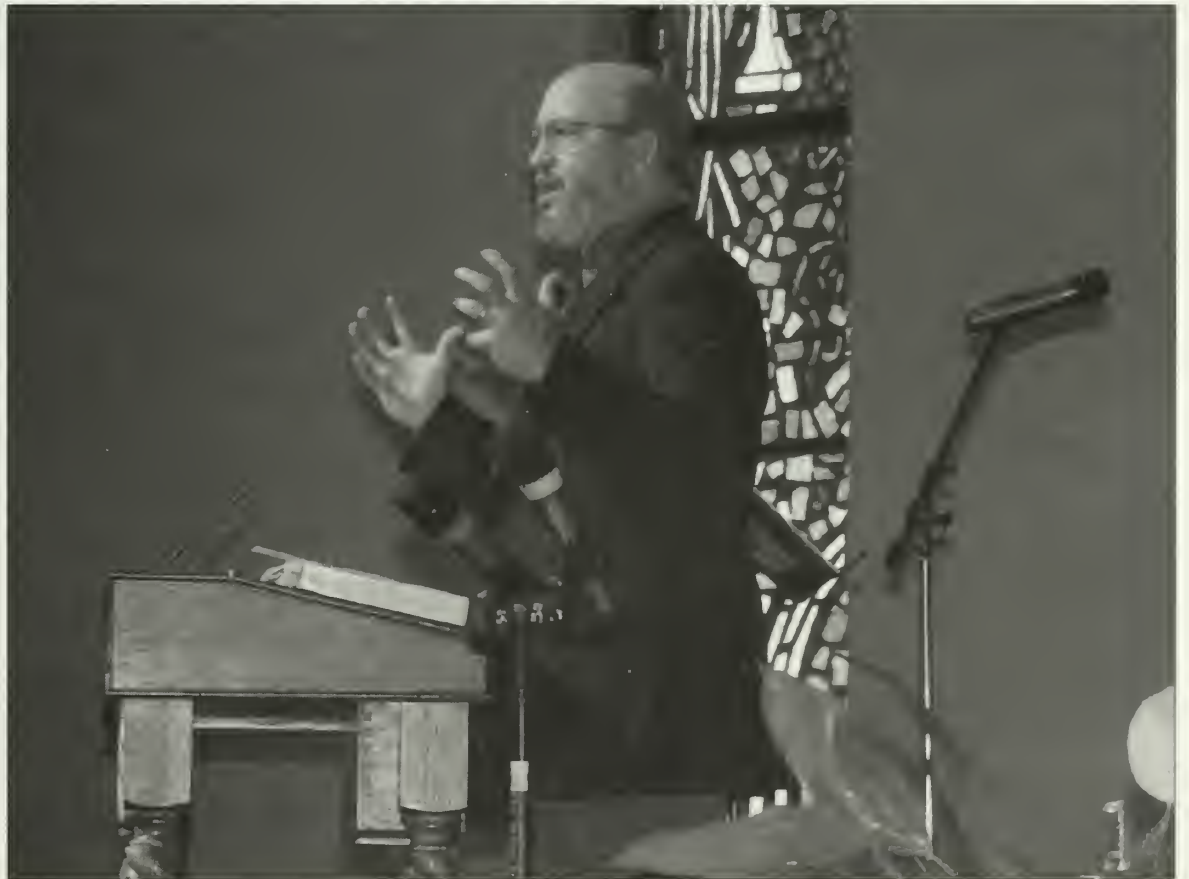

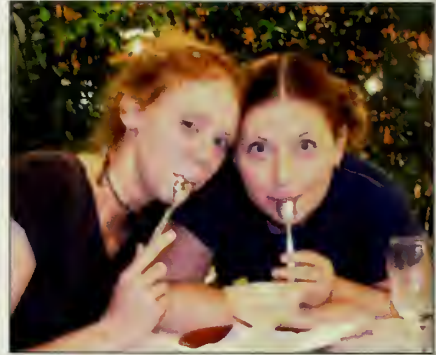

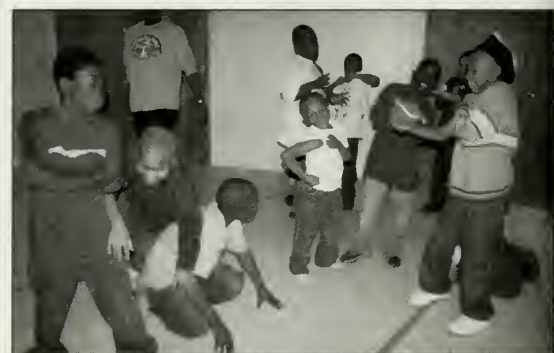

Angel Tree is a ministry through which students of Trevecca and groups associated with Trevecca sponsor area children who would not normally receive gifts for Christmas. Trevecca students are able to sign up for an “angel” in the weeks leading up to the Angel Tree event and then go out and purchase gifts for them and give those gifts out at the annual Christmas party. This year the campus ministries council was able to recruit more than 120 student and faculty sponsors for approximately 200 “angels.”

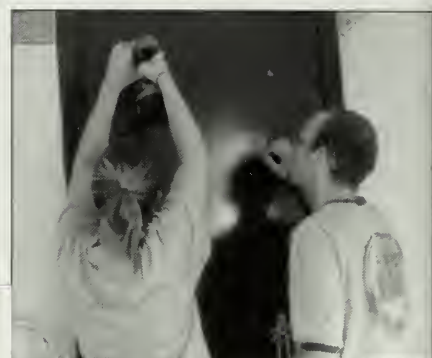

Despite severe tragedy before and during the season, the Trojans managed to overcome and put together one of the most successful seasons in school history. After losing senior Robert Garrett before the school year, the team started the season with a school-record nine straight wins and a debut at No. 6 on the first NAIA poll of the season. The team claimed big wins over highly ranked teams, was undefeated on the road in conference play, and took NCAA Division-I Tennessee State to overtime. Near the end of the regular season, senior point guard and team leader Brandon Howard suffered a career-ending leg injury. The team rallied around freshman point guard Alex Renfro, winning four of the final five games and earning the TranSouth regular season title. 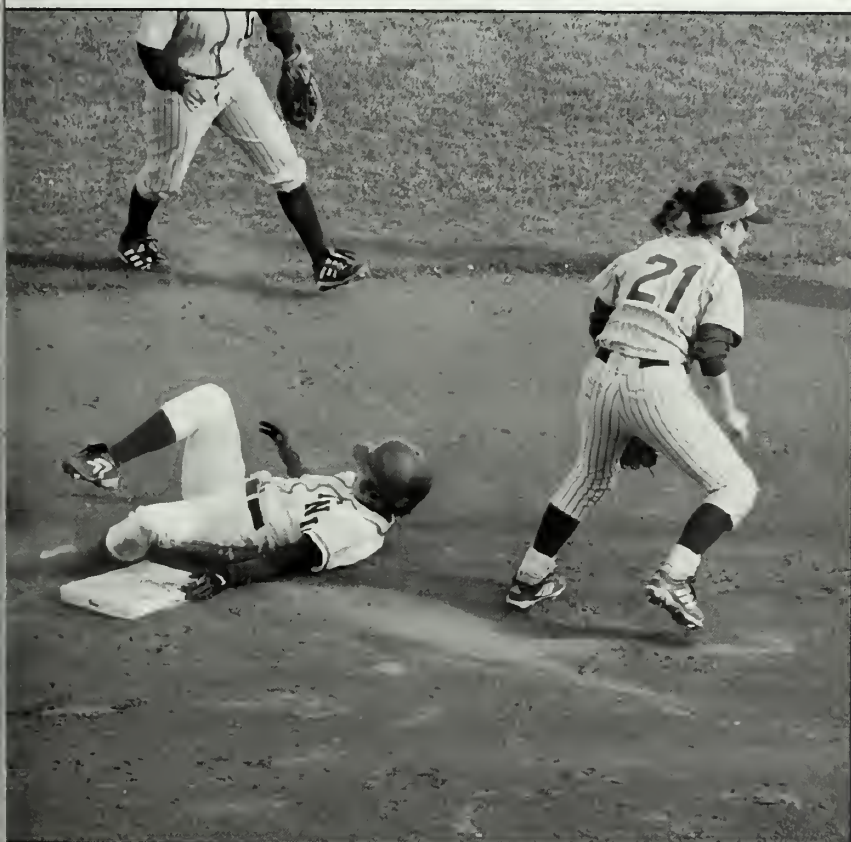

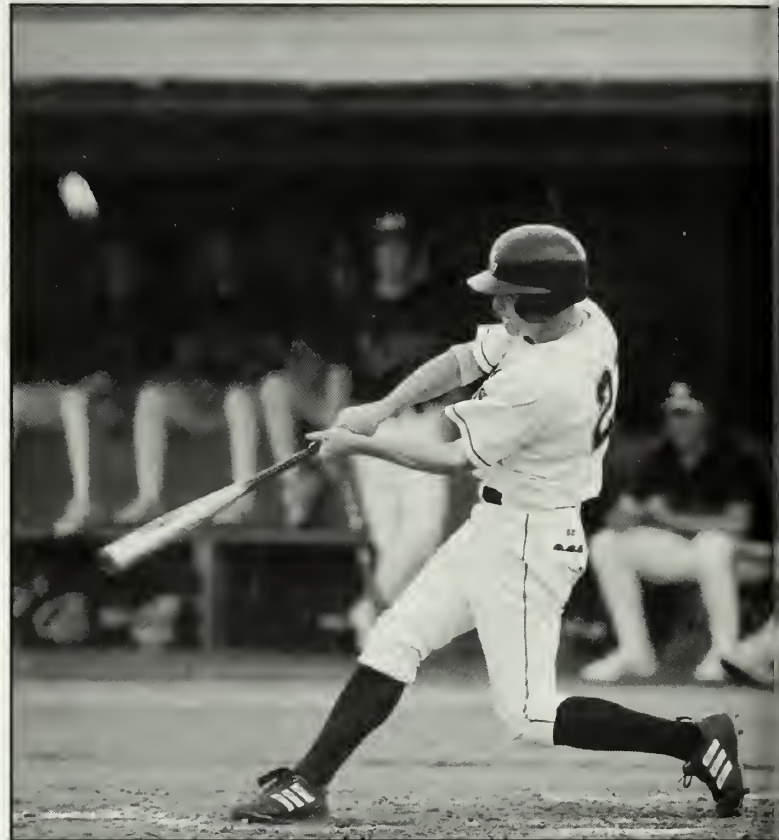

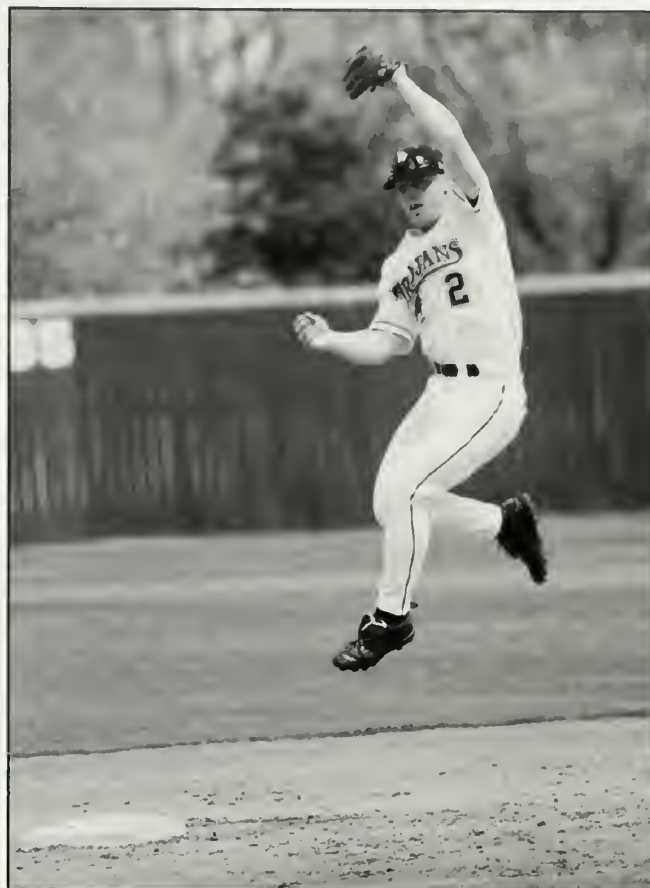

The Trevecca men's baseball team, under Head Coach Jeff Forehand in his fifth year, had its most successful season ever this year, with a school-record 45 wins and a trip to the NAIA National Tournament. 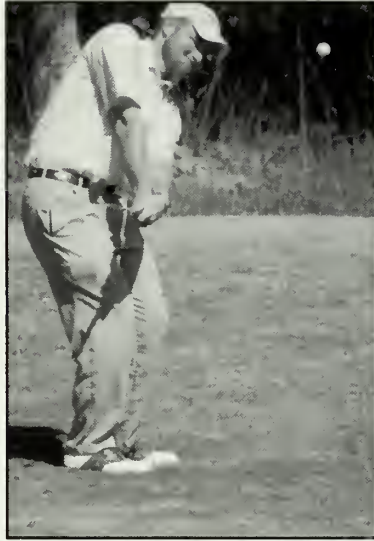

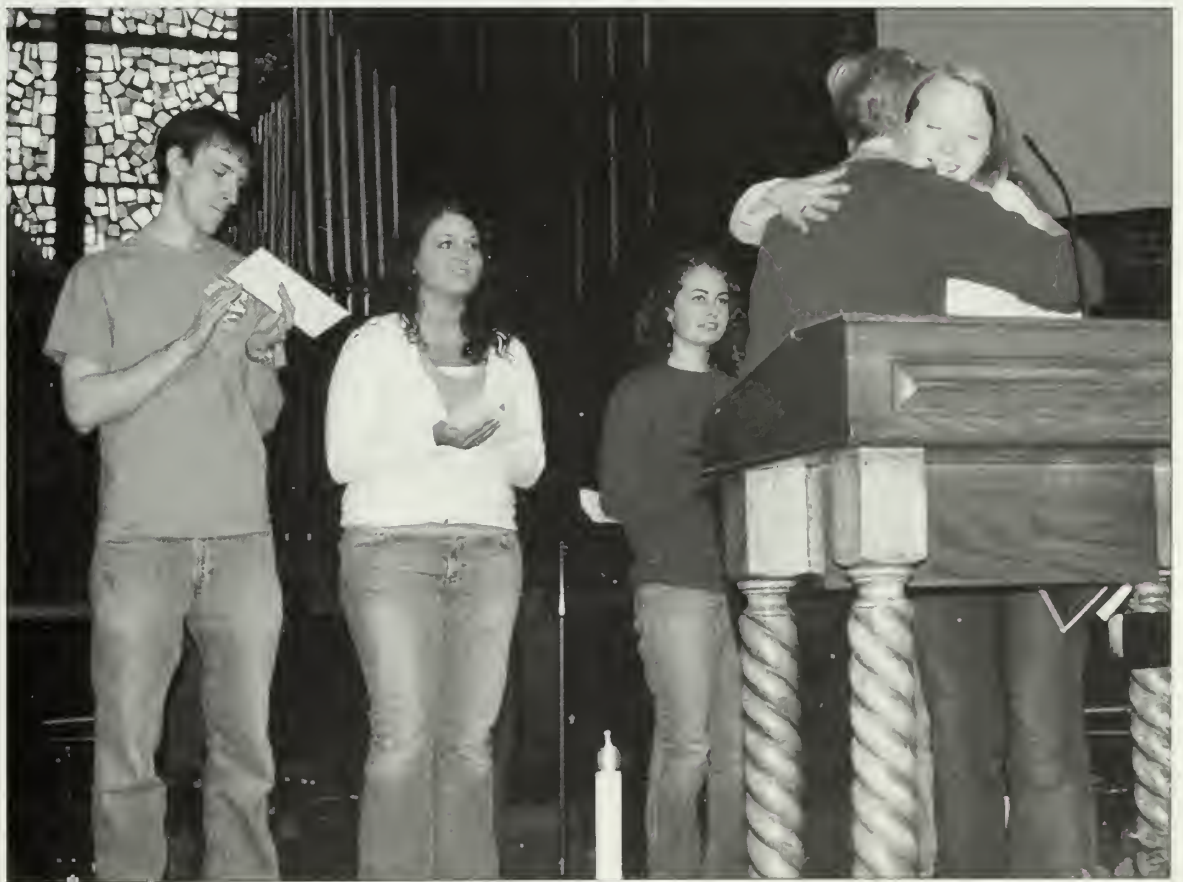

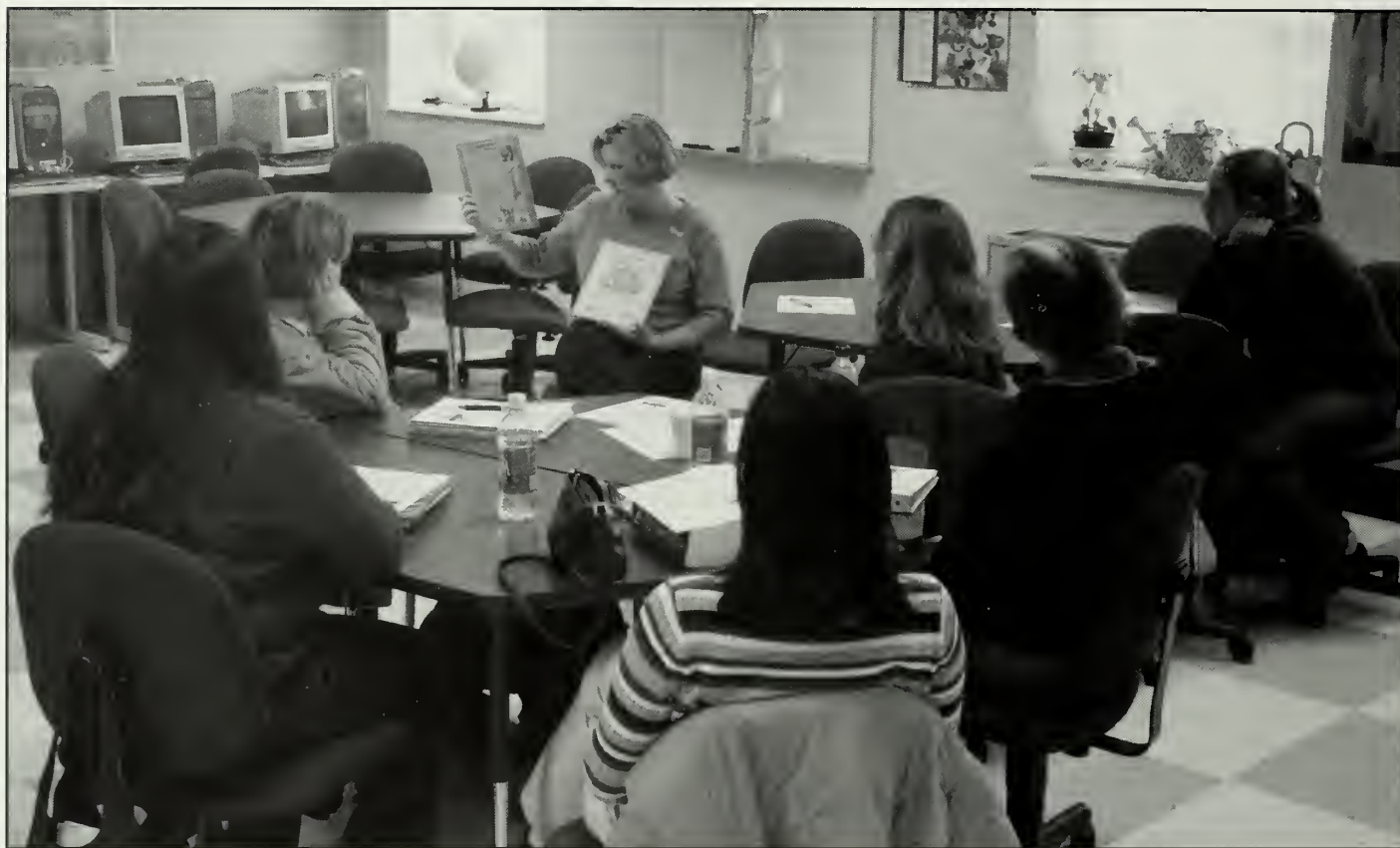

Epilogue

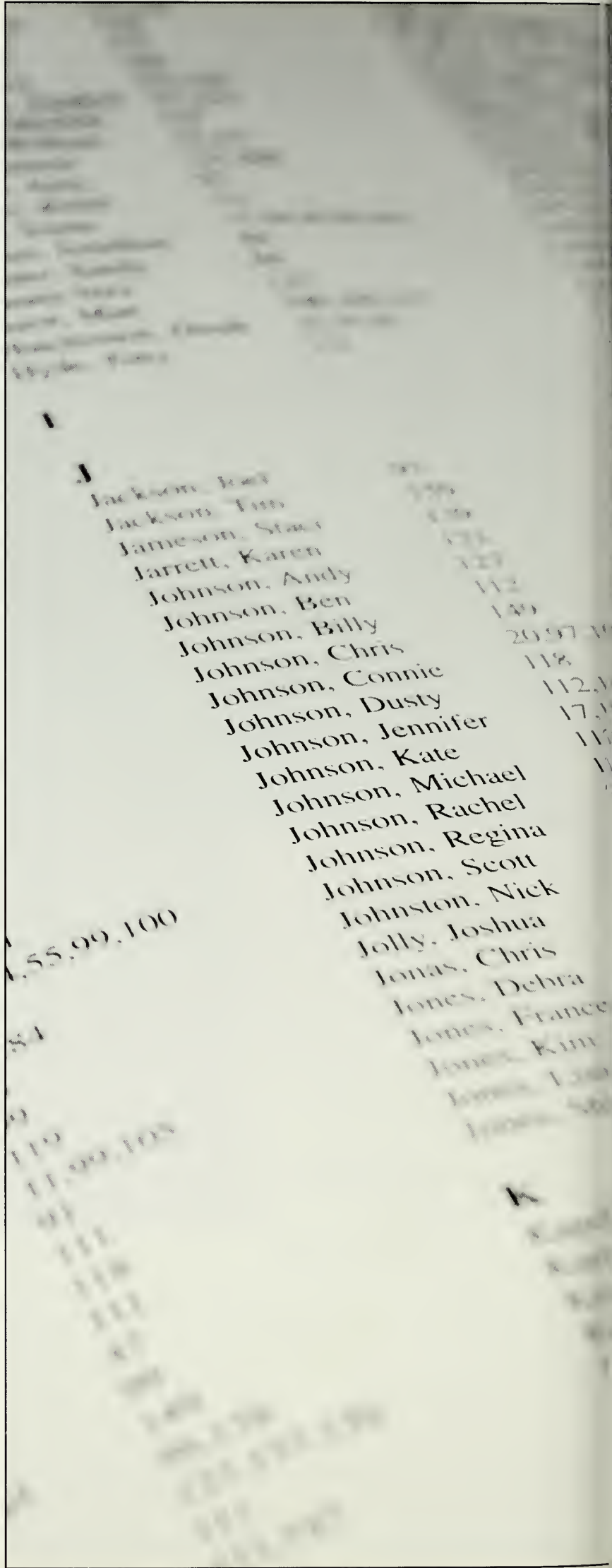


One of the best examples of the idea of collective individuality on Trevecca's campus was Robert Garrett III, known to us as "Rob G." Rob was killed in a car accident on his way back to campus to begin his senior year in the fall. A starter on the basketball team, Rob transcended the groups people place themselves into and managed to be one of the few people who was loved by everyone on campus. Always quick with a smile and a kind word even to people he didn't know, Rob was a perfect example of this year's *Darda* theme. He knew what it meant to be an individual, but he also knew how to be part of something bigger than himself, both on the court and on this campus. Evidence of the love Trevecca had for Rob was showed in the weeks after his death as students from all walks of life gathered in the gym to share their memories of Rob, as students and faculty signed cards and banners for Rob, and as the Trevecca community filled the church at his funeral. Through our memories of Rob and his example of reaching out to everyone he encountered, the faculty, administration, and students of Trevecca saw what it really means to be a true individual who is also a part of a collective group.
