# P R E S I D E N T

The value of Christian Education is being revealed by sharp contrast in the present conflict. Educational leaders are beginning to recognize that a factual education, with only mental development, is not sufficient preparation for the trials, vicissitudes, and problems incident to a world crisis such as this generation finds itself in. The absence of an adequate standard of values on the part of many supposedly educated people is causing the very foundation of democracy to crumble. The future freedom of governments and institutions is at stake. Many educators realize this and are endeavoring to change their curriculum and emphasis to meet the situation.

Northwest Nazarene College and other evangelical educational institutions stand out in bold relief in this contrast, for they were founded to emphasize the importance of a rounded-cut development of character which includes the whole being of a man. The nature and authority of God have been recognized and exalted; the value of divine revelation as given in the Bible has always been a vital part of both the platform and teaching of the schools; the students have been constantly reminded in various ways, that a personal Christian experience is the proper means of motivation to be right and to do right, and all have been urged to seek and to obtain an experience which would satisfy. In addition to this emphasis and teaching, by bringing together hundreds of young people with high ideals, these schools have provided the most desirable social atmosphere and contacts for young people. This type of educational work has produced citizens of the highest caliber, who are today rendering valuable service to their country both in the military service and in civilian activities.

Northwest Nazarene College is proud of her record in developing character in the past, but is not resting on those laurels. She is today looking ahead, endeavoring to train young people to face the problems incident to the post-war world as well as to the Kingdom of God on the earth.
