




To you, Dr. Thelma B. Culver, we devotedly dedicate this Oasis.









### FOREWORD


"Nay, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us."

### N.N.C. HISTORY

"He went forth conquering"—REV. 6:2


Northwest Nazarene College began thirty-six years ago when Mr. Eugene Emerson caught the vision of conquering for Christ amid the sagebrush of southern Idaho. He persevered until he saw the school well on its way to development. His mantle was passed on to successors well worthy of the important position of president.

Dr. H. Orton Wiley conferred degrees on the first college graduating class in 1917. His ten-year term of service marked a valuable period in the life of the school. Dr. J. G. Morrison served as president for a few months until he was appointed to the position of Foreign Missions Secretary. Dr. R. E. Gilmore, serving during the difficult depression years, exhibited courage and faith that the cause would win.

Dr. R. V. DeLong assumed the position of leadership in 1935. Facing great odds, he contributed indomitable courage which placed the college on a firm foundation physically, scholastically, and spiritually. The campus improvements included the enlargement of Emerson Administration Building, the construction of Morrison Hall, and the R. T. Williams Library. In 1931 the College of Liberal Arts was accepted as a member of Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools. In the spring of 1937 the college received full accreditation as a four-year college by the Northwest Association. The next year the college was elected to membership in the Association of American Colleges. Dr. DeLong merits great respect for his unswerving devotion to the cause of Christian education. Truly, "he went forth conquering."

His mantle fell upon the shoulders of our present, much-loved president, Dr. I. T. Corlett. Under his direction, ways and means of providing additional housing for veterans was secured. The new dormitory for boys, Chapman Hall, was completed. The College Coffee Shop was installed and the high school facilities enlarged. With the organization of the prayer band and its close to 6,000 members, has come divine guidance to iron out the problems of our school.



Our first stop is at the Emerson Administration Building, the training ground for new recruits to begin their preparation for their Crusade for Christ.




MORRISON HALL

CHAPMAN HALL








### The Old and New












President Elmore Vail and his committee provide an adequate program for the young people of College Church. They have done a wonderful job this year in presenting a varied and interesting program.










### GIRLS' CHORUS






# SPECIAL ENTERTAINMENT

DR. HOWARD V. MILLER "Having obtained a good report through faith."—Heb. 11:39.

Northwest Nazarene College and the Church of the Nazarene have lost both a personal friend and a trusted leader in the sudden death of General Superintendent Miller.

Howard Miller joined the church in the state of New York. He later served as District Superintendent of the New York and the New England districts. From the New York district he came west to pastor the First Church in Chicago, where he was a very successful pastor. In 1939 he again turned westward and joined the faculty here at N.N.C. His term of teaching was short however for after one year of service he was elected to the General Superintendency and served in that capacity until his recent death.

In 1943 Dr. and Mrs. Miller set up the Miller Lecture Series and have financed the bringing of an outstanding church leader to the campus for one week each year to speak both to the ministerial students and the entire student body in chapel. For the past five years these lectures have encouraged students and faculty by both the fellowship and ministry of the men who are brought to the campus. The College Church is now continuing the lectures in honor of Dr. Miller.

The administration, faculty, student body and Oasis Staff deeply appreciated this great man of God and feel the loss of a good friend to N.N.C.





#### TIP OFF






#### ALL STUDENT PICNIC


The day of "fun, frolic and freedom" at N.N.C. is the date of the All School Picnic, when the entire student body retreats to the hills for a good time.

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
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
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
