On the first Christmas morning it was said, "There was no room for Him in the inn." Though the world was made by Him, still "The world knew Him not!" Though He came unto His own, still "His own received Him not." Though He "Spake as never man spake," still "They sought to catch Him in His words." Though He did save others, still they defied Him to save Himself.

When they had heard His gracious words at Nazareth, they sought to reward Him by casting Him over the brow of the hill. When He restored the maniac of Gadara to his right mind, they asked Him to "Depart out of their coast." When He spoke of the "Water of life," they thought He referred to a draught from Jacob's well. When He mentioned "Bread from heaven," they thought of the manna which fed only the body. When He spoke of going whither they could not come, they thought he was going to the Jews who were dispersed among the gentiles.

But the rebuffs of the Christ have not been administered alone by sinners and unbelieving Jews. His own disciples have been "Slow of heart to believe." He was addressing a Christian church and believers in that church when He said, "Behold, I stand at the door and knock." The bitterest thing about His arrest was that it was "His own familiar friend" who betrayed Him. No witness at the trial so pierced the Master's loving heart by words of falsehood as did the denying Feter. The watching in the garden was lonely because "His disciples were asleep."

Time has wrought no fundamental changes either with the solicitation of the Christ or with the attitude of men. The sins of the children are analogous to the sins of their fathers. The Jews of Christ's time rejected and crucified the Son while professing to worship the Father. The Church of today rejects the Holy Ghost while professing to honor the Son. But the Father and the Son and the Spirit are one, so that to reject any one of the adorable trinity is to reject the other two.

With men, so with churches and movements of men. Every God called church has felt the nearness of the Christ standing without, and has been thrilled with His knock for admittance. The Church of the Nazarene feels this presence and hears this knock. Just as "It remains to be seen what God can do with a man who will let Him have his way with him," so, "It remains to be seen what God can do with a church that fully opens the door to the imploring Christ. Simultaneously with the knock of the Christ upon the door of our church, the hour of our op-

portunity struck. If we attempt to go on even as we have done, Christ will be disappointed in us. To open wide the door to Christ means to open wide the door for the outpouring of the flood of grace and glory for which we have prayed and planned.

From every angle from which the subject may be viewed, doctrinely, dispensationally, practically; from the standpoint of its possibility, its need, its means: the revival is due. Only one thing can hold it back. If the knocking of the Christ is heeded, nothing can hold

saved. The sacrifice of Christ entitles all nations to this gospel offer. This makes it the duty of the Church to see to it that all nations get the chance. This makes foreign missionary work, not a mere enterprise of the Church, not simply one of her philanthropic endeavors, not a mere expression of a divine impulse swelling in her bossom, of a passionate love for souls. No one, nor all of these combined, can express the Church's relation to foreign missions. They may be included in it as light-gleams from the effulgent sun of the Church's divine purpose. That purpose is, simply and only, world-wide evangelization. This is the only meaning of the Church's existence. God has no other use for her and has committed no other work to her. She is not, here to make a better world to live in. He has not commissioned her to solve economic or social problems.

These things may result as by-products of true gospel work, but they are merely incidental to church progress and do not form its divine purpose or mission. It can with truth be added, that only as the Church recognizes definitely the limitations and rightly apprehends the marvelous and inspiring extent of her matchless mission, can she intelligently adjust herself to her wonderful task. And in exact proportion as she sincerely strives to spread the glad news of salvation by the Blood among the unsaved millions of earth, is she really accomplishing her proper work and tending toward the attainment of her divinely ordained mission.

This work goes under the name of Foreign Missions, a term used for mere convenience. This explains why every true church exhibits a passion for missionary work and pours out men and money for gospel propagandism among the unevangelized millions of earth

The conclusion is inevitable therefore, that in proportion as a church succeeds in such foreign missionary work, is she fulfilling her mission in the world. Her success in investing men and money in gospel work among the heathen, exactly measures her success in realizing the mission on which God has sent her

To do this work successfully, there are antecedent lines of work necessary to be done. These antecedent lines of work form a foundation, or the base, on which the foreign work rests. Every base must be larger in extent than the column which is to rest on it. Imagine a cemetery graced with hundreds of magnificent marble shafts commemorating the dead and underneath each, had been placed a stone base, a half or a third smaller in area than the column it supported. If that cemetery had stood for a few years you would see all those columns leaning in different directions, caused by the earth upon which they partly rested for a base, sinking, or having been washed away. Doubtless many would be found prone on the ground. They simply could not, and did not stand erect, which was necessary to accomplish their intended purpose as memorials for the departed.

Just so, Home Missions and Evangelism, inevitably, must form the base or foundation on which is to rest safely and solidly all healthful, world-wide evangelization. It follows as a matter of course, that there is a possibility of stressing and pushing Foreign Missions with such superior earnestness and insistence, as to attain an abnormal success where the base is smaller than the column resting on it. In this case, you will find a leaning or a fallen shaft. And thus the aim in its erection is defeated.

It would be a sad day for the Church, to reach such an abnormal development. It would be top-heavy, which is a dangerous condition. We only mention it as a possibility, not that we expect to see anything of the sort, but the possibility is enough to warn us that our development must be symmetrical. Our love must be broad and deep enough toencompass all lines of church work. All success in Home Missions and Evangelism inures to the success of Foreign Missions, 50that essentially and fundamentally they are one. Every great revival held, with scoresof people saved and sanctified, is a direct and positive lift for Foreign Missions. Every new Nazarene Church organized and every Home Mission founded is but strengthening the base underneath the great cause of Foreign Missions. The positive numerical results in both kinds of work, Home and Foreign Missions, are equally precious in the sight of God. These results are lost souls, saved and sanctified by the power of the Blood. The mere accidents as to where the salvation occurred and the stamp placed on the saved are of no material consequence to God.

Evangelism and Christian Education

ONSIDered as

education makes
small progress
even in the correction of the
intellect. Training the mind increases its possibilities but does
not determine
what the value

of its increased powers really is. The trained mind may be more gruesome in its errors than the untrained mind. Education without Christianity is like putting a razor in the hands of a child. The razor is all right, but the child does not know how to use it in safety. Christianity corrects the heart and thus makes it easier to train and correct the intellect. This last statement indicates the order of true education—that is, it is salvation first—mind culture afterward.

In the Church of the Nazarene our educators are all revivalists. They all consider it a greater thing to get a soul converted and sanctified than to get a student to matriculate in any school. They all count it more necessary to have revivals in the schools than to pass the final examinations for the year's work. They all put religion above scholarship, and count the heart a more important factor in life than the head. Our schools, our members of the General Board of Education, in fact, the entire force and personnel of the educational branch of our movement have cleared the decks for action in behalf of the revival. No matter what we have been doing or are planning to do, every thing can stand aside for the revival.

No branch of our work owes more to revivals than our educational movement. The revival of the early days of the Holiness Movement made the demand for our schools. First there were the young people to train for the ministry and for the mission fields, and there were no schools that we could trust with this task on account of the general indifference to the vital things for which we stood that existed in the state and church schools; so the holiness school had its birth because the revival demanded it. As time has gone on there has been an increasing demand for educational advantages surrounded with proper moral and spiritual environment; so the holiness school has continued because the fruits of the revival required and supported

No branch of our work has contributed more to the revival than our educational movement. All our schools are centers of revival fire and the annual meetings are backed up continually with salvation work throughout the year. Then it is interesting to note that

the majority of our pastors, evangelists, superintendents, and missionaries are people who were trained in our schools. The vision which our students receive is that of places as soul winners. Leaders in secular education may content themselves by imbuing their wards with visions of political preferment and financial success, but our educatiors aspire to making our students prefer only that life which will reserve its principal rewards for the day when soul winners shall receive their crowns.

Then no branch of our work will receive more benefit from the revival than will the educational. Our educational work requires money for equipment and endowment; people will give their money for these purposes when they are swept in with the force of a soul saving revival. Our educational work re-

We have the schools, now we just want more Nazarenes to help us support them and make them serve the purpose they were intended to serve in an ever widening scope.

sick in hospitals and homes, administering to the poor, helping to care for the work among foreigners in our midst, and assist the pastor in raising means to carry forward the work of Home Missions and Evangelism, for the local, district and general interests. ASSISTING WEAKER DISTRICTS

Seeing that the whole United States and the greater part of Canada have been formed into Districts, it is evident that all the activities

of the Board must of necessity be within the districts.

A number of these districts are not able to fully support their District Superintendents, yet offer such opportunities that within a comparatively short time they will be made

on districts unable to give an adequate sup. port, as ability will permit.

ESTABLISH NEW CHURCHES

There are about forty thousand churches in America without a pastor. Many of these church buildings are vacant and offer an opportunity to establish a church at a minimum cost.

Second, the General Board of Home Missions and Evangelism shall undertake, as financial ability will permit, to establish churches in unoccupied centers as may be agreed upon by the District Superintendent in charge and the Executive Committee of the-Board.

WORK AMONG THE FOREIGNERS

There are 17,000,000 foreigners in our midst, representing 47 nationalities with 12,000,000 yet unnaturalized. There are more than 10,000,000 negroes and N. R. HERRELL. 350,000 American Indians Immigration to our shores has reached the high mark of more

> than a million per year. Third, the General Board of Home Missions and Evangelism shall undertake work among the foreign people in our midst as means and opportunity afford.

DIVISION OF MONEY

- 1. Twenty-five per cent of all money raised for Home Missions on the several districts shall be sent to the Treasurer of the General Board of Home Missions and Evangelism.
- 2. This twenty-five per cent shall constitute a fund out of which all administrative expenses shall be paid. Also assistance shall be given District Superintendents not having adequate financial support.
- 3. All claims for support from this fund of twenty-five per cent must be authorized by the Executive Committee of the Board of Home Missions and Evangelism and the General Superintendents having supervision.

SPECIAL FUNDS

1. Money contributed by individuals for the specific purpose of advancing our work in needy fields, shall be used for the purpose designated, under the direction of the General Board of Home Missions and

Evangelism.

OUR PRESENT PLAN

2. All annuity money or other special gifts to be in the hands of the General Board of Home Missions and Evangelism, to be used by said Board in the furtherance of our work as their judgment may indicate.

GENERAL SECRETARY

The plan provides for a Secretary-Treasurer, with Headquarters at Kansas City, Mo. Through this central office the several Districts are enabled to co-operate, the stronger Districts assisting the weaker until all become self-supporting and workers together in getting the gospel to the world. In spirit this is Scriptural, in system reasonable, and in operation practicable.

CO-OPERATING WITH DISTRICT , SUPERINTENDENTS

The General Board of Home Missions and Evangelism purpose to work in hearty co-operation with the District Superintendents. The motive, vision and aim of both is the evangelizing of the United States and Canada. So in this union of effort we hope to forward the cause of the gospel.

WORK TOGETHER WITH THE PASTORS

The general and district work of Home Missions and Evangelism must include the pastor and local church in order to have a working system. The quickest way to kill a general or district work is to cut it off from the pastor and local church. Since the General Board of Foreign Missions find it best for their work to provide three societies for each local church, is it not reason-

able that the interests of Home Missions and Evangelism should have at least one society under the supervision of the pastor in each local church?

OUR PRESENT PLAN

The work of the society would be to give out literature, placing and keeping tract boxes



self-supporting, providing the District Superintendent be compensated, so that he can give his time to the work.

The Relation of Home Missions and Evangelism to the World-Wide Revival

HE greatest need of our land is the spreading of full salvation, but the question of getting this need solved is the problem of the day. "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge." For this reason we need and must have Home Missions and Evangelism in order that we may see a World-Wide Revival.

PLENTY OF CHURCHES

Yes, there are plenty of churches! dead churches! churches with their doors closed, and members who know not the first principles of Bible salvation, churches with "Ichabod" written over their door, the glory of the Lord long since departed, if He ever was there. From these very places the call comes to the home missionary and the evangelist, "Come over and help us!" Shall we enter these needy fields? Have we not the preachers? the workers? Are we not responsible? "Am I my brother's keeper?" "One of the two which heard John speak and followed him, was Andrew, . . . He first findeth his own brother and saith unto him, We have found . . . the Christ, and he brought him to Jesus" ()no. 1:40, 41, 42).

ARE WE RESPONSIBLE?

Does the World-Wide Revival depend upon us? We who have the light and know the way are responsible to some extent. Many who are now sitting in darkness and the shadow of death might be brought to Jesus through the influence of a mission, an evangelistic meeting, a tract, or some personal invitation.

"If I win the one next to me
And you win the one next to you,
In no time at all we'll win them all—
Win them, win them, one by one."

"For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved. How then shall they call upon him in whom they have not believed? And how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard? And how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach except they be sent?"

We sometimes hear the question: "Do foreign missions pay?" Readily do we answer, "Yea, verily." Then, too, we would ask: "Do home missions and evangelism pay?" How many who have been down in the depths of sin have, through the work of a mission or evangelistic meeting and her earnest workers, been saved to a life of blessing and usefulness in the home and community. And many are out winning others to Jesus. Also those who are nominal Christians, having a name to live but who are dead, spiritually, need the light. "This know also that in the last days perilous times shall come, for men shall be lovers of their own selves, . . . having a form of godliness but denying the power."

IS IT POSSIBLE?

It may take "line upon line, precept upon precept." Oftentimes only through a determined effort can they be reached, but "God is no respecter of persons;" and in order to see these brought to the Lord, a Holy Ghost fire-baptized band of workers must go into these unoccupied fields and remain until the city is stirred. Many of this class will see the difference between dead formality and real Bible salvation and gladly yield to the Lord. Someone must be back of such an effort in order to propagate a World-Wide Revival. Who can but the General Board of Home Missions and Evangelism? Therefore we would say the relation of Home Missions and Evangelism is quite imperative to a World-Wide Revival.

Home Missions and the Sunday School By C. J. Kinne

HIS question is some what similar to the old age-old query as to which was first, the chicken or the egg? We might ask, Do Home Missions help the Sunday schools promote Home Missions? It would be correct to

answer "yes" to both questions.

That the Sunday school is a potent agency in the establishing of churches may be seen in the fact that while you rarely ever see a

healthy church without a Sunday school, there are a great many flourishing Sunday schools where there are no churches.

In the rural districts the Sunday school has long been a Home Mission agent in the establishment of churches, and where there is a parent church to foster and encourage Sunday schools in outlying districts, they will grow into churches. It is impossible to properly discuss this subject in the limited space alotted to us, so we will simply attempt to answer one question,—What should be the attitude of the Sunday school interests of the Church of the Nazarene toward Home Missions?

Our problem is mainly a city problem. If we are called to "Christianize the Christianity" of our land our work must be well established in all the great centers of the nation. The surest and best way to reach any city community is through the children and the home. A live, well-organized and spiritual Sunday school is the greatest of all human agencies for building up the Church, and, given a start, the Sunday school is a real home missionary force; but in the cities there must be at least one strong church to foster and encourage the Sunday school before it can exist as such a force.

Granting the above statement to be correct, it needs no argument to convince our Sunday school forces that if we would make our efforts count most for the salvation of our nation we should do all in our power to aid in establishing a Church of the Nazarene in every city in America. This being accomplished, we will have an unlimited field in which to expand our Sunday school work.

In every city where our Church becomes established we can then push out and through new Sunday schools plant more churches and reach multitudes of homes with the gospel of full salvation.

The Sunday school is not intended as a money-gathering agency and we should not attempt to make it such. Nevertheless, one of the lessons that should be drilled into every attendant is that of systematic giving. In nearly all Sunday schools the offerings of the school are expected to provide for the running expenses of the school, and in the majority of schools there are some special days set apart the offerings of which go to Foreign Missions, and special effort is made to create a missionary spirit. We are just as much under obligation to teach Home Missions in the Sunday school as we are to teach Foreign Missions. The Bible knows no "Home" or "Foreign." In a Bible sense "missions" means the plan or effort to get the gospel into every heart and home where it is not, be that at home or abroad. The Sunday school forces of the Church of the Nazarene should be enlisted in the work of evangelizing our home land as well as in reaching out unto the regions beyond.

ERE the apostle sets forth the order of the ministry of the church, beginning at the pioneer who blazes the way, on down to the pastor who takes care of the sheep, and builds them a comfortable fold.

The first in order is the apostle; pioneer, or "blazer of the trail."

Mr. Webster defines the apostle as "the missionary who first plants the Christian faith in any part of the world. Also one who initiates any great moral reform, or who first advocates any important belief." This would make the Home Missionary who first "bazes the trail" for organized holiness, an apostle of holiness. If you please, an apostle of the Church of the Nazarene.

Not every preacher can be a "trail blazer." He must have a peculiar fitness for this work if he succeeds. To blaze the way means that the apostles thus called must have so deep a conviction of the necessity of establishing a church that no scoffer or scorner can bluff him, cool his ardor, or intimidate him in the least, until his work under God is finished. He must be made out of the stuff that knows no defeat.

The pioneer will go to a town where he is not wanted, and stay until the people think they can not get along without him. He will endure a shower of over-ripe eggs or stones, and see his tent burned by a rowdy crowd, and still have grace to sing "I'm happy with Jesus alone." He must be a man who would not recognize defeat if he met him in the road, but would down him the first blow, brush off the dust, write success all over his back, and march him off down the road in front of him, while he sings "At the front of the battle, you will find me."

This is the class of preachers who have "blazed the trail" for the Church of the Nazarene in former days, and this is the class that are still needed to take charge of our Home Mission Campaigns. In those days we did not ask what is the salary, we only asked for a place to preach. It was "woe is me if I preach not the Gospel." If we struck a town where people did not come to the altar, we fasted and prayed until they did come. We often had whole nights in prayer, then results would follow.

Our crying need today is real pioneer "trail blazers" with proper equipment; and a band of young active workers full of faith and fire, who are willing to serve their apprenticeship under some preacher who has had experience; who will take a tent and

plant it in a town and fast and pray and stay for real victory. Good live music, and spirit-filled shouting workers will attract attention any where, and God will give the victory.

We ought to have a Church of the Nazarene in every city, town, and hamlet in America. It can be done. We have the talent to do it, if we can only get it properly developed. We can find plenty of preachers who will take a well equipped outfit and go to such places, if our Home Missionary Boards will take care of all overhead expenses; such as moving tents, providing seats, lights, and other incidentals. Such expenses are heavier in cities and large towns than in small ones.

Where are the "trail blazers" who want tents for the coming season, who can make good, preach clear, sound doctrine, shout the victory before they start, and keep on the trail until a good church is established? Apply to your District Superintendent. Do not ask a man who does not know your ability to do pioneer work to give you a chance unless you can give good references.

Where are the people who will make it possible for these "trail blazers" to do the work? We must have men and money, our motto is, "It can be done." "I sought for a man among them,—that should make up the hedge, and stand in the gap before me for the land, that I should not destroy it; but I found none" (Ezekiel 22:30).

Evangelism as Related to Publishing Interests By DeLance Wallace



OME one has a ptly defined Evangelism as meaning "The Church in action." Dr. Chalmers once said it was the distinc-

tion between aggressive work and attractive work. It is the "striking out" or going forth in aggression, aiming at and bringing souls to Christ.

Our nearest attempt in definition of "The Relation of Evangelism to the Nazarene Publishing House" would be to go back to the primitive New Testament church which was called the Bride of Christ. The Bride might appear attractive and yet be a corpse; but to be aggressive there must be real life and vigor, red blood coursing through every vein, and which is Dr. Chalmer's definition of Evangelism.

General Superintendent Williams recently wrote in words that may well be called classic:

The Publishing House, the heart that pumps the blood through the body of the church. Without it and the literature published by it we can not live, and consequently we could do no good toward the salvation of this world. The call of the church is not only to bring the

world to Christ but to feed the sheep who are in the fold. To conserve, to keep those persevering who have been saved and sanctified is a part of our commission. This can be done if the people read, feed their souls on good literature, the truth, the real gospel of Jesus Christ. There are only two ways to get the truth into the hearts of men to save them and keep them saved, one by the spoken Word and the other by the written Word. Both means must be used.

Rev. Canon Tristram says the missionary going without literature would be like sending workmen without tools, soldiers without arms; while to rely upon literature without the living voice of the preacher would be to send the arms and make a shipment of military stores, but to leave the regiment behind. There must be the living voice and the written word. But there are places where the "silent preacher" could enter, where the ear is adder-deaf.

Look at a single instance of the fruitage of a printed page carried in the pocket of a Bohemian nobleman, later loaned by him to John Huss and bringing him to a knowledge of the purity and power of the truth as it is in Christ Jesus. A little further down and we read of Farrell, the first French reformer, and Martin Luther whose preface to his comment on the book of Galatians found its way to the heart of a tinker, John Bunyan, and John Wesley became arrested while reading his preface to his comment on the book of

it back. Whatever I have had that would Thy holy, gentle presence offend, I detest it and cast it from me—hateful thing. Whatever Thou would bring to me, I count that gift my richest jewel and pray Thee let it adorn my spirit forevermore. And Thou, abide with me.

Romans. Onward our "silent preacher" is the evangel that reaches Richard Baxter, Phillip Doddridge, William Wilberforce, Leigh Richmond and Thos. Chalmers, from whose pen we quote above, all these and many more being dead yet speak through the printed page.

The Church of the Nazarene, as a part of the Bride of Christ, must be in the forefront of the world-wide Evangelism and as such the Publishing House must be what Dr. Williams terms it.

Each individual member of the Church of the Nazarene is one unit of her "Publishing Interests" in sending forth a full gospel to the whole world, which must emanate from the Publishing House. It must be as true of us as it was when one of the Romish churches in the Reformation Period said, rather growlingly, "The Gospellers of these days do fill the realm with so many of their noisome little books that they be like swarms of locusts that did infest the land of Egypt."

A copy of the Herald of Holiness was sent to a man in Arizona who read it and immediately went 200 miles to hear Bud Robinson and got saved at the first service. A recent issue of the same paper found its way to a home in St. Louis, the result of which the whole family found one of our churches, got saved and are now members of the church.

Your money, your brain, your blood and sinew and your prayers must co-operate to put into our Publishing House real red-blooded life, and everything that goes with Evangelism, if we are to be presented a "glorious Church without spot or wrinkle." We are your co-laborers in getting the Gospel out.

Home Missions and the District Superintendent

HE Church of the Nazarene is yet young and comparatively small, nevertheless, it has a work to do and a message to deliver.

The work is to evangelize, the message is that of full salvation. To do this we must push out into new territory, lead sinners to the Lord and believers into the blessing of holiness, organize churches and strengthen our base of supply, from which support must come for missionaries who are to go into all the world preaching the gospel.

To facilitate this work the General Board of Home Missions and Evangelism was created. It is the purpose of this Board to work in harmony with the District Superintendents, whose duty it is to open new fields and organize churches. The Superintendent's task is not an easy one, as the writer knows from several years' experience. He goes into a new place, hires a hall, sees to his advertis-

ing, or pitches a tent, often driving the stakes himself, gets lumber together, builds a platform, looks after the seats, secures an instrument for music, works and sweats until meeting time, when he mounts the platform, sings, preaches, and exhorts and often remains until a late hour praying seekers through to God. His only regret is that he can not be in a dozen places at the same time preaching the gospel and laying foundations for other Nazarene Churches on his district.

Some of our District Superintendents have been thus engaged for several years, many on small salaries, and by their untiring zeal have spread holiness and built churches until we have reached our present numerical strength.

We must now make it possible for our District Superintendents to have a living salary and to employ workers on their districts that several new places may be worked at the same time, and the weak churches evangelized and built up, that the work God has called us to do may move on more rapidly.

The Superintendent knows his district, sees the many opportunities, but is often hindered by lack of funds to carry on the work.

The General Board of Home Missions is doing its best to stand by the District Superintendents in their great work and the courch must stand by the General Board, and the district boards, if we are to carry forth the work before us.

The District Superintendent must have consecrated, self-sacrificing men and women to help him. Real missionaries are needed here as well as in the foreign field. He must have money for the home work, not to pay a few workers big salaries, but to support as many good workers as possible on his district, in opening new fields and evangelizing among the smaller churches.

We should respond liberally to the appeal for home missions. Money thus invested affects every department of the church.

We must back our Superintendents and encourage them in aggressive work. There is no limit to what can be done among more than a hundred million people.

Home Missions as Related to Young People's Societies By Rev. G. Howard Rowe

HE heralding of God's Truth is going on as never before. With cities large and small yet untouched with the truths of holiness, the call is sounding to advance. The object and vision of the church is to preach the Truth and to spread and conserve Scriptural holiness in every town village and hamlet. People are hungry for the Truth; let us get it to them. This is the purpose of Home Missions and Evangelism.

Young People's Societies should be a great asset to this work. Home Missions and the young people's work are inseparable. Without young blood the future church is doomed,

and young people without the vision are lost. The work of evangelism needs young people with their fiery energy, untiring zeal, fervor, enthusiasm and the love of sacrifice. There is a call for missionaries in the foreign fields and there is a call for missionaries in the home field. Home Missions need pastors to fill old churches when revived and new ones when organized; deaconesses to canvas new fields; and leaders to hold cottage meetings in prospective fields. Where shall they come from?

Young People's Societies shoud be useful in securing and training workers. The young people's meeting should have so much fire and glory that souls would be saved and sanctified and called into active service regularly. With the vision of evangelism held continuously before them the church would hold her young people. Many are lost because of inactivity. The vision kept upon them would give a goal at which to aim. Home Missions is a field for active service. Something to spend the energy, call out the sacrifice, heat up the enthusiasm, and fire up the zeal. To subdue the enemy and to capture the spoil, is the vision of the warrior. There is defensive and aggressive warfare. Early

The societies should plan for Home Mission meetings and conventions and raise monies for the support of Home Missions and Evangelism, They should do local Home Mission work entering adjoining towns, holding cottage meetings and when large enough, call on Home Mission Board and plant a church, Much prayer and co-operation between the two fields would insure great success, in the promotion of a World-Wide Revival.

1. Ingratitude. Take this sin, for instance, and write down under it all the instances you can remember, wherein you have received favors from God, for which you have never exercised gratitude. How many cases can you remember? Some remarkable providence, some wonderful turn of events that saved you from ruin. Set down the instances of God's goodness to you when you were in sin, before your conversion. Then the mercy of God in the circumstances of your conversion, for which you have never been half thankful enough. The numerous mercies you have received since. How long the catalogue of instances, where your ingratitude is so black that you are forced to hide your face in confusion! Now go on your knees, and confess them one by one to God, and ask forgiveness. The very act of confession, by the laws of suggestion, will bring up others to your memory. Put down these. Go over these three or four times in this way, and you will find an astonishing amount of mercies, for which you have never thanked God. Then take another sin. Let it be,

2. Want of love to God. Write that down and go over all the instances you can remember, when you did not give to the blessed God that hearty love which you ought.

Think how grieved and alarmed you would be, if you discovered any flagging of affection for you in your wife, husband, or children; if you saw somebody else engrossing their hearts, and thoughts, and time. Perhaps, in such a case, you would well nigh die with a just and virtuous jealousy. 3. Neglect of the Bible. Put down the cases. when for days, and perhaps for weeks-yea, it may be, even for months together, you had no pleasure in God's Word. Many people read over a whole chapter in such a way, that if they were put under oath when they have done, they could not tell what they have been reading. other piece of intelligence that greatly interested you, would you not remember what you read last? And the fact that you fold a leaf or put in a string, demonstrates that you read father as a task, than from love or reverence for the Word of God. The Word of God is the rule of your duty. And do you pay so little regard to it as not to remember what you read? If so, no wonder that you live so at random, and that your religion is such a miserable failure.

- 4. Unbelief. Instances in which you have virtually charged the God of truth with lying, by your unbelief of His express promises and declarations. God has promised to give the Holy Spirit to them that ask him. Now, have you believed this? Have you expected Him to answer? Have you not virtually said in your hearts, when you prayed for the Holy Spirit, "I do not believe that I shall receive Him?" If you have not believed nor expected you should receive the blessing, which God has expressly promised, you have charged Him with
- 5. Neglect of prayer. Times when you omitted secret prayer, family prayer, and prayermeetings, or have prayed in such a way as more grievously to offend God, than to have neglected it altogether,
- 6. Neglect of the means of grace. When you have suffered trifling excuses to prevent your attending meetings, have neglected and poured contempt upon the means of salvation, merely from disrelish of spiritual duties.
- 7. The manner in which you have performed those duties-want of feeling-want of faith-worldly frame of mind-so that your words were nothing but the mere chattering of a wretch, that did not deserve that God should feel the least care for him. When you have fallen down upon your knees, and said your prayers, in such an unfeeling and careless manner, that if you had been put under oath five minutes after you left your closet, you could not have told what you had been praying for.
- 8. Your want of love for the souls of your fellow-men. Look around upon your friends and relations, and remember how little compassion you have felt for them. You have stood by and seen them going right to hell, and it seems as though you did not care if they did. How many days have there been, in which you did not make their condition the subject of a single fervent prayer, or even an ardent desire for their salvation?
- 9. Your want of care for the heathen. Perhaps you have not cared enough for them to attempt to learn their condition; perhaps not even to take a Missionary paper. Look at this, and see how much you do really care for the heathen, and set down honestly the real amount of your feelings for them. and your desire for their salvation. Measure your desire for their salvation by the self-denial you practice, in giving of your substance to send them the Gosnel. Do you deny yourself even the hurlful superfluities of life, such as tea, coffee, and tobacco? Do you retrench your style of living, and really subject yourself to any inconvenience to save them? Do you daily pray for them in your closet? Do you statedly attend the monthly concert? Are you from month to month laying by something to put into the treasury of the Lord, when you go up to pray? If you are not doing these things, and if your soul is not agonized for the poor benighted heathen, why are you such a hypocrite as to pretend to be a Christian? Why, your profession is an insult to Jesus Christ!
- 10. Your neglect of family duties. How you have lived before them, how you have prayed, what

an example you have set before them. What direct efforts do you habitually make for their spiritual good? What duty have you not neglected?

11. Neglect of social duties.

12. Neglect of watchfulness over your own life. Instances in which you have hurried over your private duties, and not taken-yourself to task, nor honestly made up your accounts with God. Where you have entirely neglected to watch your conduct, and have been off your guard, and have sinned before the world, and before the church, and before God.

13. Neglect to watch over your brethren. How often have you broken your covenant, that you would watch over them in the Lord! How little do you know or care about the state of their souls? And yet you are under a solemn oath to watch over them. What have you done to make yourself acquainted with them? How many of them have you interested yourself for, to know their spiritual state? Go over the list, and wherever you find there has been a neglect, write it down. How many times have you seen your brethren growing cold in religion, and have not spoken to them about it? You have seen them beginning to neglect one duty after another, and you did not reprove them in a brotherly way. You have seen them falling into sin, and you let them go on. And yet you pretend to love them. What a hypocrite! Would you see your wife or child going into disgrace, or into the fire, and hold your peace? No, you would not. What do you think of yourself, then, to pretend to love Christ, while you can see them going into disgrace, and say nothing to them?

14. Neglect of self-denial. There are many professors who are willing to do almost any thing in religion, that does not require self-denial. But when they are called to do any thing that requires them to deny themselves, Oh! that is too much. think they are doing a great deal for God, and doing about as much as He ought to ask in reason, if they are only doing what they can do about as well as not; but they are not willing to deny themselves any comfort or convenience whatever, for the sake of serving the Lord. They will not willingly suffer reproach for the name of Christ. Nor will they deny themselves the luxuries of life, to save a world from hell. So far are they from remembering that self-denial is a condition of discipleship, that they do not know what self-denial is, They never have really denied themselves a riband or a pin for Christ, and for the gospel. Oh, how soon such professors will be in hell! Some are giving of their abundance, and are giving much, and are ready to complain that others don't give more: when, in truth, they do not give anything that they need, anything that they could enjoy, if they kept it. They only give of their surplus wealth; and perhaps that poor woman, who puts in twelve and a half cents at the monthly concert, has exercised more self-denial, than they have in giving thousands.

Why We Exist

EVER have we heard or read of a simultaneous World-Wide Revival, for the conversion of sinners and the sanctification of believers promoted by any organized body. We believe that the proposed World-Wide Revival Campaign for the month of January, 1922, by the Church of the Nazarene, is the first effort of its kind in the history of the world. And why not? Is not the command to "go ye into all the world" as binding upon the disciples of today, as to those to whom it was spoken, some two thousand years ago? Did not the Son of God, suffer and die for mankind regardless of nationality, race or color? Do we not read that "God so loved the world that He gave His Son"? And if Jesus died for all the world, and God made His gift to all the world, and the command is to go to all the world, then what else will the Church of the Nazarene be doing in this world-wide effort, but obeying her Lord?

Again, never has there been a time in the history of the world, when matters pertaining to mankind, have been carried onward in such gigantic and colossal proportions as at present. A few hours spent at one of the world's great sea ports, watching the incoming and outgoing vessels with their great cargoes, or near one of the great railroad trunk lines, watching the passenger trains with their masses of humanity; or freight trains with their millions of tons of merchandise and one will be convinced of a great organized effort simultaneously carried on. Recently we sat in the office of an acquaintance, who, has the management of a business that girdles the globe. We noticed the clerks' coming and going, the telegrams and cablegrams that were being received and sent, and the great whirl of business that touched the far ends of the earth, and yet seemingly there was not the slightest evidence of any thing that would cause the least cessation or jar to the vast volume of business being transacted. We caught just a glimpse, or vision of the tremendous proportions of the business being transacted and we could but admire the perfect system which made it possible.

The Church of the Nazarene, practically girdles the globe, and one and all, in every department of the organization, profess to be endeavoring to carry on the same business, i. e. the salvation of the souls of men, by getting sinners converted, and believers sanctified wholly. That being the case, why should not the church enter into, and carry out a great simultaneous effort, when every department of the church, and every person in each department at the same time and all together, enter into a combined effort to make a great campaign that would girdle the globe and bring the greatest results?

Jesus said, "Ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." When He had thus spoken and had left them, what did they do? They gathered for a prayermeeting which continued until the Holy Ghost came, who, when He arrived, set up a new order of things that astonished men and devils. How often, in those days, did the disciples resort to prayer? How often do we read, "and when they had prayed" or words akin to them, and something always transpired. If the Church of the Nazarene, beginning New Year's eve, will simultaneously, all around the world, go to prayer and keep at it every night down through that first week,

heaven alone knows what may take place. And nothing much, nothing supernatural, nothing lasting, nothing startling, nothing that will amaze men, astonish hell and cause heaven to rejoice will be accomplished without much prayer. Prayer unlocks God's storehouse, opens up heaven's glories and gains "riches untold."

If every church, mission, school, and each and every department of the Church of the Nazarene will, on the first Sunday in January, organize for a week of prayer, and leaving all else out, pray without ceasing, no earthly tongue can foretell what will take place.

On the second Sunday in the month, organize for a week of house-to-house visitation, giving out printed invitations to the Church of the Nazarene where a World-Wide Revival is going on, also give out copies of the Herald of Holiness, and hold cottage prayermeetings during the day, all coming together at night for a great prayermeeting, God alone knows what would take place before that second week was past. This scribe ventures the assertion, that if the aforementioned plan is carried out, there will be but little need of help from the outside, and that the Church of the Nazarene would have a revival on her hands, such as she has never known in her history. God would visit His people!

What would be the results? We repeat—no tongue can tell, but we venture to assert some things that would come to pass. Many people who now know nothing of the Church of the Nazarene would attend the services, and many become warm friends and supporters; many would be converted; many would be reclaimed; many would be sanctified wholly; many would unite with the Church of the Nazarene; many would be healed of divers diseases. The church would take on new vitality and strength; money would be forthcoming for every department; new houses of worship would be provided for; money for missions both at home and abroad; money for our schools which are so much in want; money for the Publishing interests, money for the extension of the work in every ramification and department. And brethren-it is the only thing that will bring about these results. Oh, for a great World-Wide Revival, that will make the heart of Jesus glad. The church exists only that she might save the lost. This is our one job.
