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Hold Up The Bible

HERE appear certain evidences of the powers of darkness to deprive the church of her confidence in the blessed Book and thus rob her of the source of knowledge of God's will and the unfolding of His gracious plan. To all the Apostle has said "Let the Word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom."

This is no time to begin to question the foundations, but rather to re-affirm unqualified faith in every utterance of the Sacred Pages. This is no time to stand back and let arrogant skepticism in pulpit and pew have the whole "say," else many unstable souls may be eternally lost. Nor shall we halt in trembling fear at the boasted array of so called scholarship that is used as one of the stock arguments of these modern skeptics. Nor shall we cower before the highsounding "hypothesis" of the oftquoted "scientists."

That a battle is on is without question. The enemy has daringly invaded the sacred inclosures of the church of Christ. He has insinuated his way into the consideration of many an unsuspecting victim. Thousands are being swept from the only foundation upon which they may build a tower of strength and character that will stand the storms of this life and crown its conflicts with eternal glory. The bugle call is heard in the land; the battle lines are forming; cleavage between those who hold to the inerrancy of the Scriptures, and those who variously qualify their acceptance, is clear to any candid observer. This marks a day for every true soldier of Jesus Christ to give his flag to the breeze and hang a placard of supreme loyalty in every front window that all who pass may see that his adherence is unequivocal.

It is not enough for us to congratulate ourselves that we believe "the truth, the whole truth; and nothing but the truth" as found in the Bible. We must strengthen our confidence by a constant rehearsal of our belief. We must give clear declarations to others, that we may encourage them in a similar stand in their sphere. Every part of the great army must encourage every other division. There can be no doubt that God has raised us up for a time like this.

When the Apostle says "dwell richly" he evidently refers to the Shekinah glory. Where God's Word is, there is God. Where God's Holy Word is honored, there God bestows His honor. Where God's Word is proclaimed and conscientiously believed and accepted, there is to be found the constant "Abiding Presence." This old tottering, sinwrecked world needs men and women who, literally staggering under conviction that the Bible is the Voice of God speaking to a lost humanity, will go out with impassioned hearts and fiery lips and "Preach the Word." Not only to say "Thus saith the Lord," but equally "*This is the Word* of the Lord." Hungry hearts everywhere are longing, looking, for some ray of light, some fountain of life, some fortress of protection, some consolation of hope. Shall they go by unsatisfied while we have the "Word of the Lord"?

That Word teaches that by it "faith cometh," Rom. 10:17, that it is designed for regenerating, Jas. 1:18, 1 Pet. 1:23; that it is designed for sanctifying, Jno. 17:17, Eph. 5:26. It conveys the only truth of immortality (Col. 1:15) concerning which heathenism has very uncertain notions, while it knows nothing of the resurrection. It is a "form" (2 Tim. 1:13) that is, a sketch, a plan, an outline of a building, namely, the great plan of salvation. Men are not left to invent religions for themselves. God speaks. The Word is to be "held forth" (Phil. 2:16) as a lighthouse for guiding tempest-tost souls into the haven of eternal rest.

The Word is a light, a lamp, a beacon, a sign. It is quick, sharp, fiery, powerful, convincing, convicting. It is as a hammer, (Jer. 23:29), as a fire (Jer. 23:29), a sword (Eph. 6:17). It saves, sanctifies, edifies, comforts, consoles.

The *Bible* has stood the assaults of men and devils combined, the weakness of its friends, and the hatred of its most depraved enemies. It will be the supreme law of the universe when England's Magna Charter, and American's Monroe Doctrine, and the League of Nations are forgotten. The ages of eternity alone will reveal its wonderful wisdom, its gracious provisions, and its (now) uncomprehensible value to the saints during their earthly pilgrimage.

Lift the Bible up before the congregations of the people, declare it to be the Law of God, the Voice of Heaven, the Word of Authority, the only Rule of Faith and Practice. Proclaim its Spirit-breathed inspiration—that it "came not in old time by the will of man: but holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost." Preach the Bible positively, preach it consistently; preach it with compelling conviction; preach it without apology. Preach it with the glow of life, and in the hour of death it will sustain your departing spirit.

THE CAT IN THE MILL

THE old mill was infested with rats. Poison was not to be thought of for use in a mill, traps required too much attention; so the miller decided to get a cat as an antidote for the rats. But the first cat he brought did not stay because of the noise made by the mill, and every cat he could get left for a like cause. He secured some cats which were said to be great ratters, but always when the mill started, the clatter of belts and pulleys and the roar of the machinery frightened the cats away from the mill.

At last, upon the advice of a friend, the miller secured a very young kitten. The kitten was so interested in its surroundings and had so little knowledge of danger that it did not mind the noise of the mill. Of course, it did not catch many rats for a while, but it did stay in the mill. After a while the kitten's cat-nature asserted itself and the kitten-no, cat it was by this time-became interested in rats in a way that promised very little for the future of the rat tribe. Of course, there were some people who could never think of the cat as much of any thing but a kitten, because it had been in the mill all its life and was, therefore, without honor like the prophet who preaches in his own country. But the truth was, nevertheless, that this "native grown" cat did more to rid the mill of rats than all the "imported" cats the miller ever tried; even though the imported cats did have pedigree and reputation behind them.

Well, this is rather a long story, but what I was going to say is that there is no special reason for Nazarenes to "forget themselves for joy" when the report comes that a great preacher from some other denomination has been brought into the Church of the Nazarene. I used to glory, some in such occurrences, but I have come to trust more in "the cat that grew up in the mill." If a man has preached for twenty years in another church and has arisen to prominence in its ministry, it will be a rare instance if he makes any special mark in the work of the Church of the Nazarène. The Church of the Nazarene is not another Methodist church, nor another Presbyterian church, it is a distinctive movement within itself and has a type and brand that is hard to imitate.

Then it does not affect me very much when I hear that some man who came to us with a pedigree and reputation has decided to leave us. If you will go back over the list, you will see that a great many of these did not "stay in the mill;" or if they did stay, they did not do a great deal to help us on. Of course, if mature and fully developed ministers come to cast their lot with us, we will welcome them and will hope that the sound of the machinery will not frighten them away. But their coming is not a matter of great importance to the real success of our movement and their leaving should discourage very little. It is difficult for a "man to be born again when he



is old," but unless a preacher can become a real Nazarene he will not help us much by just "joining;" in fact, he may hinder more than he helps. A preacher who comes to us principally to get a job will be hard to please and will be a liability, rather than an asset to us.

Speaking on the other side of the question: the eight hundred young people in our own colleges who are preparing for definite Christian work at home and in the foreign field are our greatest pledge of success in the future. The children of our own homes, the scholars in our Sunday schools, and the members of our Young People's Societies are our dependence for leaders tomorrow. We must plan to train our own preachers and workers. We need cats, but in order to keep them when they get to be cats, we must get them while they are kittens.

TRUTH THE BEST ANTIDOTE FOR ERROR

→ HE silence of the church on any truth exposes the communicants and attendants of the church to damaging error. The neglect of proper attention to the study of prophecy opens the door for Adventism, Russellism, and kindred errors. If preachers will stick close to the Word of God and give proper emphasis to prophetic subjects, few of their people will go off after the shadows which delude the multitudes. The Bible says a great deal about the Second Coming of Christ and more people are interested in this than in any other single Bible theme. They are going to hear and read on this subject; if they can not get orthodox teaching, they will get what they can.

The Bible teaches that God heals the body in answer to the prayer of faith.³ The neglect of this precious truth has opened the door for Christian Science and various hurtful errors concerning healing. Jesus gave a great deal of attention to the healing of the bodies of men when He was in this world, and if we would lay stronger emphasis on the Bible doctrine of Divine healing, we would do more toward heading off error than all of our attacks upon heterodox systems will do.

The Bible teaches the possibility of being sanctified wholly here and now and it sets forth the conditions upon which this grace is obtained; and whenever men have ceased to use every means to spread Scriptural holiness over the land, they have opened the way for hurtful errors. Witness the many errors concerning holiness that are to be found in the average modern church! These errors took root because the truth was not faithfully and persistently preached. Attacks upon error are at best only partially successful; it is the truth, the whole truth preached in the power of the Spirit of God that leaves no room for error which does the most to settle and ground men in the "faith once delivered unto the saints."

THE VERITIES OF CHRISTIANITY

✓ HERE are many things that we believe concerning doctrines and practices about which we are not permitted to be absolutely certain. Whatever the Bible teaches is true, but my interpretation of what the Bible says, is likely to be faulty, so I can afford to have a great deal of charity for those who differ with me concerning particular points of creed and conduct. But there are a few things that I know. I once had a sense of guilt and a burden of sin upon my conscience and heart; that burden was taken away when I came in faith to Jesus Christ. Skeptics may argue that it was but a psychical change and principally a matter of my own mental attitude, but no matter what they say, I know that the burden that once distressed me was taken away. I know, also, that down through the years of my life as I have continued to believe, this peace has remained as an ever enduring heritage. And because I know this, I know also that every thing which these facts require are true; the deity of Jesus Christ, His death for the sins of men, His resurrection from the dead, His intercession for me in heaven, the coming of the Holy Spirit into the world; all these must be true because a thing that I know is true depends upon them.

After I obtained peace through faith in Christ, I found a "conviction of want" within my soul and through faith in Christ this want was supplied. The old sense of hunger for inward purity was banished when I trusted Christ to make me whole. Men may dispute with me regarding *terms*, but I am absolutely certain of the *fact*; and because I know that I obtained purity. and spiritual triumph, I know that there is efficacy in the blood of Jesus and reality in the baptism with the Holy Ghost, for the fact in my experience requires these.

I know that my soul has communion with God from day to day. My mental interpretations of His attributes and predicables may not be altogether dependable, but the existence and communicativeness of God are facts, because His communion with my soul depends upon them.

I will not be altogether dogmatic on any matter in which my intellect is pitted against the intellect of others, but surely no one will ask me to come back from the realm of verities in my soul's experience to the sphere of uncertainty in which I used to move and in which the disputer confesses still to dwell. I do not absolutely know very many things, but such as I do know I must witness to uncompromisingly.

BAD FOR THE CHURCH EITHER WAY

T HE evangelist reported that he found the spirituality of the church at a very low ebb; the pastor wrote me that the evangelist left the church in a deplorable condition. Now, I am no arbiter of such matters, but I will tell you how the matter was and will leave the decision with you.

The church was running along on a fairly even keel, paying the local expenses, getting up a good missionary offering and making such headway as it could. It was rather a new church and was not reaching a great many outside people, but the revival was planned and announced with the hope and expectation that there would be an ingathering from among the unconverted and unsanctified.

Well, the evangelist came in good faith and tried to reach such outside people as he could, but he did not have much success. The days were passing and there was no break, so the evangelist trained his guns on "the sinners in Zion." He struck in to straighten out the church. There were some conscientious, well meaning people in the church who were not very well settled. They got stirred up and some of them came to the altar. Some of them confessed that they had never been really sanctified, and so there was somewhat of a stir and the evangelist counted that he had done the church quite a service.

But some of the people who made confessions in the meeting became dictators, mounted the judgment seat and tried to "help" the other members of the church. Then the other members of the church were reminded of the fickleness of the would-be judges and decided to withhold confidence until "the evidence was all in." The evangelist got away before the real results of the revival fully appeared; the pastor stayed on and tried to collect his forces "after the battle," and hopes that he will be able to restore unity within the church, re-establish confidence on the part of those without the church, and. later on, gather in some souls and add strength to his congregation. The pastor is not a great talker, but regarding evangelists, he says, "hereafter, we must know who is who, before engaging them."

RELIGIOUS LITERATURE FOR THE BLIND

There are sixty thousand people in the United States and, although provision is made for teaching them to read, there is very little religious literature available in the Braille type at the present time. The Home Missions Council and the Council of Women for Home Missions of the Federation of the Churches of Christ in America has appointed a committee to investigate and help make arrangements to provide for this special need.

That is a true ministry which brings the man face to face with the living Christ.

ABOUT PUFFING UP THE PREACHER

T is not altogether unusual to hear persons say that they would be glad to say some word of appreciation or do some deed of kindness for the pastor, only for the fear of causing the preacher to become puffed up. Of course, it would be a bad thing to cause the preacher to become vain, but you know I have just been wondering about the state of the person who honestly looks for such results from his own words. A few words of sincere flattery from the President, the Governor, or from the General Superintendent might turn the preacher's head; but would he not be a stupid fellow if he should take a word from you or me so seriously? And do you not think we are putting a rather high estimate on the value of our little opinion when we withhold it for fear it will flatter the other fellow? In other words, is not the fellow a little puffed up who thinks he could puff the other fellow up so easily?

Then there is another side to the question: if your importance is such that a few words from you would make the preacher vain, indeed, how much the poor fellow must suffer when you do not say any thing at all? You know you must smile or frown, and if your smile is so laden with life, how blighting must be your frown!

But there is some compensation for being poor and unimportant. If you are like that (in your own eyes) you can be natural. Say the good word that gratitude stirs within your heart, do the kind deed that your soul desires to do; you will get the blessing which your goodness merits and still no one will be tempted to lose sight of ordinary mortals because they have become accustomed to looking up to you.

Questions Answered

Q. How do you harmonize Paul's command for women not to speak in public, but to ask their husbands at home with God's call to women to go and preach the Gospel and His blessings upon them when they do so? J. H. W., Idaho.

Ans. The uneducated women of Corinth disturbed the services of the newly founded Christfan church by continually calling upon their husbands for explanations of things which they did not understand regarding the new faith. The Apostle wrote forbidding them to ask these questions in the churches but permitting them to learn all they could from their husbands by asking them questions at home. The question of the call to preach is a matter to be decided by the Lord Himself and is an act of His sovereign will. It would seem to me that as a rule God calls men to preach the Gospel, as an exception to this rule, He calls women; and He blesses and honors the labors of the preacher whom He calls whether that preacher is a man or a woman. To those who desire a fuller study of this subject, I would commend Mrs. Anna May Fisher's little book, "The Woman Preacher" which may be obtained from our Publishing House for fifteen cents a copy.

Q. How is the unbelieving husband sanctified by the wife and vice versa (1 Cor. 7:14)? W. W. L., Ohio.

Ans. It is on the question of whether the Christian should continue to live with the heathen as husband or wife. The answer is, let them continue to dwell together unless the heathen party does the departing; for, says the Apostle, it is a legitimate and real marriage and the offspring from the union is holy (legitimate). If the marriage were not real marriage the children would be unclean (illegitimate). But it would be readily argued that marriage is a Christian institution; admitting this, the Apostle save the Christian party legitimatizes the marriage, in this sense, sanctifying the unbelieving partner. In verse sixteen he expresses the hope that the Christian partner may be able to lead his mate to personal, spiritual salvation.

Q. Is Satan omnipresent the same as God? W. W. L., Ohio,

Ans. He is not. God, men, holy angels, and fallen angels are, so far as we know, the only personalities in the universe. Personalities are alike in that they possess the three essential attributes of intellect, sensibility, and will. In simple words, sensibility means feeling and will means power. Now attribute and essence are not the same thing. In essence God and angels are spirituality; man is spirituality and materiality. A personality's presence is measured by the relative perfection of his attributes, and since God alone possesses attributes that are absolutely perfect, He alone is omniscient, omnipresent, or absolutely good. Since we are fairly sure that Satan's personal attributes are more nearly perfect than our own, we reason that his presence extends to a much wider scope than does that of any human being. He may even be of sufficient perfection of attributes to enable him to be present in all parts of the world at the same time; but he is finite-only God is infinite. When you add to the possibilities of Satan's superior attributes the fact that he is represented and supported by myriads of lesser intelligencies-the fallen angels, demonsyou begin to see how it happens that the Devil does not slight any one or any place by leaving them alone, and how it comes that he is practically omnipresent, so far as we are concerned.

God has commanded holiness of us; He has willed and promised it to us in the present world. There are examples of those who possessed and lived it.

God's Lamp Posts By Rev. Oscar Hudson

Text: "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven" (Matt. 5:16).

IGHT is the crown and glory of the visible world. It is the source of life and energy to the body, and symbol of truth to the soul. Everything that lives and thrives in the whole kingdom of nature derives strength and stimulus from light.

When we would describe a scene of peculiar desolation, we say, There is no light there. Man makes his fellow-man the companion of misery by surrounding him with prison walls and pitiless doors through which the cheering rays of light can never pass. When the Scriptures would shadow forth the horrors of a home where despair reigns supreme, they shut out the light and bind its wretched inmates under chains of darkness forever.

When Old Sol backs his car out of the chambers of the morning and starts his shafts of dawn after the receding shadows, we call it light. When the scientist, struggling with his invention, comes upon some principle calculated to lead him to success, he calls it light. When the police, striving to solve a mysterious tragedy, falls upon something which gives him a lead, he calls it light. When the Bible student comprehends a truth of which he was ignorant, he calls it light.

So in the advancement of God's kingdom on earth, one of the important necessities is



light. Heaven longs to burst forth upon a sinful world and waits only for a channel. This text would indicate that our chief mission is to shine. A candle is not put under a bushel but on a candlestick. So we are, in a peculiar sense God's lamp posts.

In our study of this familiar text, we desire to place the emphasis upon different words contained therein, and would say,

1. Let your light shine.

This brings us face to face with the necessity of an impartation of divine grace to the human heart. Nothing shines until it is touched by an energy outside of itself. The candle may be perfectly formed, its particles correctly united and the wick in place; it may be placed on a pedestal in a socket of gold, but it will never shine until combustion from without itself comes in contact with its wick. The incandescent globe may be in the socket, placed in the finest chandelier and surrounded by the most luminous reflectors, but there will never be any illumination until the current originating outside of the globe, touches its inward arrangement.

Just so it is with the human life. There will be no shining until it is touched by power divine. No one can be what God intends every one shall be—God's Lamp Posts—until He touches them with the holy flame of His burning love. There may be intelligence, culture, prestige, wealth, etc., but no one can shine for Him until they are touched by power divine.

Jesus said to Nicodemus, "Ye must be born again." When this "Ruler of the synagogue," asked for an explanation, He replied, "Except a man be born of the water and of the Spirit. He can not enter into the kingdom of God." In this age of religion without salvation, churchanity without Christianity, formality without power, our constant cry should be back to experimental, Holy Ghost wrought, salvation. While others urge sinners to "hit the sawdust trail," sign a card or hold up the hand, let us continue to preach hell and damnation until awful conviction seizes the few who stop long enough to get our message, bow at a mercy seat and pray through to something real. Let us urge upon our hearers the necessity of something more than a mental assent to the demands of Christ; more than conversion to a school of theology; more than ritualism and ceremony -the formation of a living Christ in the heart. No one will ever shine without this. We may join the Nazarene Church and even profess the second blessing, but the light of holiness will never radiate from a human heart until the blazing, burning, bubbling, pentecostal blessing fills the heart and life. Others

may manufacture a type of minister that will reflect their ideals, but the church of the living God must insist on those, who would herald the good news of His kingdom on earth, "tarrying at Jerusalem until endued with power from on high."

The opposition we are meeting is not so much on account of the peculiarity of our doctrines. It is not just because we preach a second blessing; but because we insist upon our would-be converts waiting before the Lord until His grace floods their souls. When we cease to do this, we will become as tame as others, and meet no more opposition from the ungodly than worldly professors who do not claim this grace. I will say it this way: to the extent we lose the fire of God's holy love, hell's animosity ceases to be directed against us. The Devil is opposed to light and not doctrines, so much. When the light on God's lamp post goes out, there will be nothing to disturb the skulking demons who hang in the shadows and seek their prey under cover of darkness.

2. Let your light shine.

The word, "let," means, among other things, to remove the hindrances or obstructions. See to it, that there is nothing which interrupts the rays of light as they sweep out on their radius of illumination. There are those who have obtained salvation, but whose usefulness is destroyed, who shed no light because of peculiarities, petty, often, in their nature. Or it may be they hold to fads or have eccentrics which ruin their chances for doing good. How often have you heard some one speaking of certain parties and use the remark, "Well, he is a good man, but," and the "but" introduces reference to something which mars what might otherwise be a useful life. I once knew an elderly woman whose life was without reproach. She attended church regularly and supported it with her means; but she had a custom of dancing in nearly every service she attended, and this ruined her usefulness.

Now demonstration in the Spirit is lawful and beneficial to the one who demonstrates as well as others, but this lady would slowly lay aside her wraps, quietly walk out of her pew and often do something to call the attention of the people to the fact that she was about to begin, and she became a disgust to the young people of the church and drove them away. Her light was obstructed and instead of giving light, was darkness. I knew a preacher who was conscientious and clean in his life, but who had become accustomed to running on impressions, "leadings," as he termed it, and he would do some of the most unreasonable things, until those about him lost confidence in him as a leader. He would feel led to do a certain thing today and probably the opposite tomorrow. He would feel "led" to go to a place for a revival meeting, and if the meeting was hard and poorly attended would have difficulty to keep from feeling "led" to go away.

Every obstruction should be taken away from those who would shine for the Lord. Whatever hinders us and prevents us from doing the most good to the most people, should be laid aside. I stood admiring what appeared to be a very beautiful lady. Her form was symmetrical and skin possessed a lovely tint. The features, as far as I could see, were smooth and she was a person to be admired, but while I was thus considering her she turned around, and behold, the other side of her face was marred by an unsightly scar. Ever after that when I thought of that lady. I did not think of the beauty with which I was first attracted, but I could only think of that scar. I thought of that which prevented her from being the beautiful character which first filled my mind.

Just so it is with those who espouse the cause of Christ. There may be pure gold and wealth of character, but if there are things which mar this beauty, and those whom we should bless with our lives, become conscious of the presence of these defects, they will immediately forget the beauty with which they were first attracted while contemplating that which ruins this beauty. By giving away in the evil hour, a Christian may destroy more confidence in a moment than he can build in years. In fact there are multitudes of good people, men and women who possess a measure of grace, who because they have not been careful to guard against things which provoke criticism and destroy confidence; are worthless to the church and accomplish nothing in the great battle against darkness and sin. A little unkindness here, impatience there, carelessness in remarks about others, or in business affairs, a haughty spirit and worldly attire-these are some of the things which hinder the Christian's light and prevent it from shining.

There are those who have done things which have offended others. In some instances these same persons have repented before the Lord and were forgiven, but have neglected to make reparation with the offended party. Too proud to make confession, too stubborn to beg pardon and forgiveness, too deficient in spirituality to feel the need, they obtain a measure of relief in their own minds and proceed through life reflecting shadows which cause others to stumble when God intends that they shall shed help and illumination.

3. Let your light shine.

The Christian life and service is an individual matter. In this connection the Lord is not speaking to some one by your side, some in front, or back of you, but to you. We are given entirely too much to "comparing ourselves among ourselves and measuring ourselves by ourselves." It seems to be perfectly natural for us to look at the failures and weaknesses of others which often causes us to fail to discover our own. In fact many of the difficulties which we blame others with, are the direct result of our own actions and are chargeable to us. It is generally the case that the one who is having the most to say about the short comings of those about, is guilty of the most irregularities and inconsistencies. "Let *your* light shine," would indicate that the Lord would have us interested in ourselves first of all.

While entertaining company, Mrs. Hart looked out upon the street and said, "Oh, look what a soiled dress Mrs. S— is wearing! I would be ashamed to get out on the street wearing such a thing." Her guest looking out of the window at the lady referred to, replied, "Mrs. Hart, the soil you see is not on Mrs. S—'s dress, but on your own window pane." "For wherein thou judgest another thou condemnest thyself; for thou that judgest doest the same thing."

It is not guide posts the Lord is talking about here, but lamp posts. It is not some one to point the way so much, that He is hunting, but some one that will show the way. We should not be telling the people how it is done, but give them a demonstration. Let a fellow start running down the street and he will not go two blocks until some one will wonder where he is running to and take in after him to find out. Soon another will say, "What in the world are those fellows running for?" and take in after them to find out what is the matter. Before they have gone a mile a crowd will be running with all their might, and the whole thing starting from one person leading the way.

A highly cultured musician visiting this country, sat one Sabbath in a New York church for worship. When the choir arose to sing, his ear was greatly offended as he detected that there was not a perfect tone in the choir. He was about to leave the room when he heard one perfect tone. Finally, another dropped into unison, then another until the entire choir was singing in perfect tones. O for some one to sing the perfect tone amid earth's discord and maelstrom of confusion until others catch the chord and join in! The one who, in his meditation, decides that everything around has about gone to the wall, will soon declare his decision, and you can pretty safely conclude that he has gone to the wall himself.

If Satan should whisper that there is no use, that others are not doing right, strive the harder. Take it that God is wanting you to become more active and is urging you to greater sacrifice and takes this means of communicating the intelligence to you. It is your light He wants to shine, and permits you to become conscious of the darkness. There is no need of a candle when the sun is shedding forth its blazing light, but when the sun has set and the moon is obscured by clouds, cease watching others and let your When friends and associates light shine. wound your feelings and you are tempted to be offended, turn and read Psalm 119:165, and learn where the trouble lies.

Soon one of them realized that their course meant death and decided that he would make another effort. He shook his companion in an effort to arouse him and finally set to rubbing him. There may be darkness about us and we may seemingly be accomplishing but little, but keep up the fight in self protection and LET YOUR LIGHT SHINE.

Knotty Bible Problems By Rev. W. E. Shepard buried by baptism

"Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life" (Rom. 6:4).

E have now come to a very interesting problem, and certainly a very mooted one. Some of the best people will not see this as the writer does. The question before us is not one of mode, but one of water. It is not a question of immersion vs. sprinkling; but the Spirit vs. water.

Should we succeed in our argument, the question would not at all be settled here regarding any particular mode, neither would it lessen at all the importance of water baptism, as enjoined by Christ. We believe in water baptism.

Read the first eleven verses of the sixth chapter of Romans carefully, and you will notice that there are four things mentioned which occurred in the experience of Jesus Christ. These four things are crucifixion, death, burial and resurrection. These are the four particular points standing out in these verses. In connection with them are four things which occur in the experience of all who get sanctified wholly. There are four elements in the experience of entire sanctification. We do not mean four successive periods, taking so much time, but simply four elements entering therein. A Christian in order to experience holiness must have a crucifixion, a death, a burial and a resurrection.

The keynote to the whole teaching is found in this fourth verse: "Like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life." Notice the keynote—"Like as—even so." Like as Christ was crucified, even so must we be crucified. Like as Christ was dead, even so must we reckon ourselves to be dead unto sin. Like as Christ was buried, even so there is a burial for us. Like as Christ was resurrected, even so there is a resurrection for us.

All four of these occurrences in the expe-

rience of Jesus are literal. All four pertaining to the Christian are spiritual. With Jesus it was a literal crucifixion; with us it is a spiritual crucifixion. With Jesus it was a literal death; with us it is a spiritual death. With Jesus it was a literal burial; with us it is a spiritual burial. With Jesus it was a literal resurrection; with us it is a spiritual resurrection. All four with Jesus were absolutely literal in every respect; all four with us are absolutely spiritual in every respect. There is not one literal thing connected with these four elements which obtain in the experience of the Christian. There is no literal cross, no literal death, no literal burial, no literal grave, no literal water, no literal anything. All is spiritual.

Now get down your rhetorics and study its rules. Some may call this a simile while others might regard it as a metaphor; the rules will apply just the same. The rules of rhetoric will not admit of a change in the simile or metaphor in the midst of such a parallel. If it is a spiritual application, it must hold throughout. The Holy Ghost and the inspired Paul knew too much about language to allow a break from the spiritual to the literal in such a case. Hence, by holding to the rules of rhetoric, and following the spiritual application of the teaching, we see no explanation except spiritual baptism. This spiritual baptism with the Holy Ghost means a spiritual burial as one of its elements: a putting away out of sight: a funeral, as it were-the old man crucified and dead, and yet the Christian risen into newness of life.

Whatever the Scriptures may teach concerning water baptism or its particular mode, it is very evident, that if language means anything, they do not teach water baptism nor its mode in this instance.

Christian Life Series By Rev. W. R. GILLEY FAITH

"It pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe.' "According to your faith be it unto you.'

▼ HESE Scriptures declare a truth that is very common to all Christians so far as the beginning of the Christian life is concerned. But not all clearly understand how vitally faith is connected with the continuance and success of the whole Christian journey. "Without faith it is impossible to please God" not only applies to the experience of salvation at the beginning but at any and all stages of the life that follows.

There is no doubt but that many who have been truly saved have let their experience die of unbelief, and this unbelief was the direct result of not knowing the need of supplying faith with the means of its own sustenance. This need not be so and perhaps, in many cases, would not be so, if people were more clearly and fully instructed in the relation of faith to the Christian life.

Faith is the connecting link between the

soul and God. Faith is the measure of the Divine blessing. Let faith get low and the supply of grace is diminished. Faith is the artery through which the fluid of Divine life is supplied to the dying soul. Let it be seriously ruptured and the Divine flow will not reach the wasting parts; and weakness, sickness, and death are the results. Jesus frequently reproved His disciples for their littleness of faith. It took constant teaching and miracle working to bring them to a proper faith in Him. Peter declares the Christian is kept by the power of God through faith. These facts and illustrations show how important it is that a good strong lively faith be developed and maintained above every other consideration of life. More vital than money, more vital than education, more vital than earthly food is it that faith in the saving, keeping power of Christ be maintained.

A most important lesson of the Christian life has been learned when we know the relation and value of faith to it. Still another important one is learned when we know how faith is to be sustained and made stronger. The Bible teaches at least two ways by which this is done.

First: "Faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God" (Rom. 10:17). This rule applies not only to faith at its beginning but to all development and increase of it; so, logically, if one were to say: "give me more faith," the way to do it would be to give more of the truth of the Word of God. Jesus followed this plan in teaching His disciples. Nothing better can be done than to imitate His example. Many, who one time were gloriously saved from sin, grow weak and fall back into the weak and beggarly elements of the world. And no wonder; for they neither study the Word of God nor hear it preached with regularity. The Bible is meat and drink to faith. It need not be expected but that faith will die when it does not get its meat and drink. Many schools and colleges are turning out preachers who are skeptics and infidels concerning the fundamental things of salvation. And no wonder: for they are taking away the vital fundamental things from the Word of God in their teaching and substituting the vain philosophies of men. These infidel preachers are passing the same religious junk and garbage on to the people, and it is no wonder Christian life and experience is at so low an ebb. Faith has been destroyed or allowed to starve to death. It could not be expected to live under such circumstances.

Knowledge of the relation of faith to the Christian life and of the Word of God to faith should lead one to be very careful from what source his faith *pabulum* is obtained. Faith can no more live on "movies," "musicals," "church entertainments," "pot-luck suppers," sermons on the "telephone poles," "Shakespeare," and such like, as substitutes for the gospel of salvation, through the power of Christ, than a cat can live on gruel made

of sawdust and water as a substitute for cream. If there is any faith nourishment in them at all it is so diluted it would take a barrel to yield a thimble full of the real Word of God. Since faith is sustained by the Word of God it is vital that there be hearing of the Word of God preached in as pure and undiluted state as possible.

A second way to increase and develop faith is by praying. Jesus said: "Men ought always to pray and not to faint." Paul said: "Praying with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit." Praying is an exercise of faith. In other words, Christians pray because they have faith. But prayer is also reciprocal to faith. Christians pray because they have faith and they have more faith because they pray. This reciprocal action of prayer is by two means. The exercise of praying tends to the enlargement of the faith faculty and the answer to prayer increases confidence and faith in God. The fact that God answers once encourages the belief that He will answer again and for greater things. So as the Christian lives a life of prayer, faith gets stronger and stronger and becomes a constant habit of the soul.

May you, dear reader, make such use of the Word of God and prayer that all through your Christian life you may have a steady increase of the grace of faith.

THE DEFIANCE OF PELE

The recent death of one of the first of the missionaries who went to the Sandwich Islands brings to remembrance the work of civilization which has been done there. It was in 1820 that the American Board sent out representatives to Hawaii. Forty years later Mr. Richard Henry Dana said: "They have taught a whole people to read and write, cipher and sew. They have given them an alphabet, a dictionary, and a grammar, preserved the language from extinction, and established schools. The missionaries found a nation of savages; they have left a civilized people."

The Princess journeyed one hundred miles, most of the way on foot, to the great crater of Kilauea. The missionaries at Hilo, twentyfive miles from the volcano, heard of her pilgrimage, and wished to meet her at the mountain. One was obliged to give up going because he had no shoes, and his feet were tender. The other had no shoes either, but he was used to walking barefooted, so he started out.

The Princess was much affected at this meeting with the missionary. The two, watched by a company of about eighty natives, descended from the rim of the crater to the "black rock." There, in full view of the terrific panorama, Kapiolani calmly spoke.

"Jebovah is my God," she said. "He kindled these fires. I fear not Pele. If I perish from the anger of Pele, you may fear the power of Pele. If I do not perish, all the gods of Hawaii are vain."

She then sang a bymn of praise, and returned to the wondering, fearful company unscathed. In that few moments she had done much to overthrow the remaining paganism.—Sel.

Besides all this, Tom, look at the amount of time and toil these busy men freely invest in these long and expensive trips and long sessions of the Board-all on account of their love for the Publishing House, which they correctly regard as being so close and dear to the heart of God. Now, Tom, compare all this with your conduct. You not only refuse to give anything, but you mouth and complain and criticize and knock the Publishing House and the noble men who are trying to save it, and you do this recklessly, with all the members of our own local church here. I have heard you at it time and again. LOCAL CHURCH AND PASTOR'S RELATION TO HOME MISSIONS

By REV. E. O. CHALFANT

T has been admitted by many that the hope of L a general growth in our vazarene movement is largely determined by the success of our Home Missionary projects and personal evangelism. a general growth in our Nazarene movement It is easily seen that we have sufficient General organizations, but we must under God go out by martyr's blood, with prayer and supplication give birth in old and new fields to new churches, and by personal evangelism have at least 100,000 new converts from highways and hedges. This line of procedure will in turn give us the corresponding increase in our general church in spirituality, numbers and money. How to bring about this needed and systematical growth is one of the present vital, knotty problems of our church.

With our Foreign Missionary interests exceeding our home ability, with scores of young men and women seeking our board to go to the foreign fields; with our educational institutions struggling for a half way existence; with our Publishing House facing its present crisis; with some 65,000,000 unchurched people in the United States alone; then with about only one person in ten attending church at all; then the great deadness that exists among our old line denominations, with their mammoth programs and their verbal confession and church membership taking the place of conscious regeneration; then think of 35,000 pulpits without a pastor, the great on-rush of wickedness and law-lessness. These and many other out-standing and staggering conditions must drive our movement to the place where we must do something worth while for the lost among us and around us, and produce a growth in our Zion that is worth while.

We have no disposition to criticise our general institutions. We must have them and put them on a firmer and easier foundation. But it is our firm conviction that greater and more substantial General Institutions alone, will not solve the question at all, but will only complicate our situation, unless we can have a larger and better co-operating constituency.

We wish this paper or article to give the readers of the HERALD OF HOLINESS something that is on our heart. We will try to discuss the relation that the local church can bear in promoting Home Missions. We think that the most of the pastors of our church take too lazy a look at the great masses of humanity around us. What our local churches need is to get out of the confines of our church walls, to high ways and hedges. We have scores of churches where there are thousands of people and in some places where there are even millions of people, and it is a pity and shame that these multiplied thousands are unchurched and dying without God, and we are meeting with our faithful few and not holding our own, and drying up and fighting a losing battle in many places. We simply want to give facts as we know them. I know by actual experience that there is no reason for not pushing out. I am a pastor with the largest membership on the Indiana District. Т have some 200 families under my care, and that is some care. My wife and I make some 1200 calls during the year, and have as many campaigns as any pastor in our connection. I am frank to confess that it takes a pastor's life and blood, but we must remember that the model pastor of the New Testament was commanded by the great apostle to the Gentiles, "to do the work of an evangelist." The common objections, I know to such plans, but none will stand the light of common sense and the Bible, for it is easily possible for pastors to put on outside campaigns.

Here is one great field. Every local church owns its own tent Have seats, and musical instruments. Find a near-by town, or if in a city of more than 10,000 you need two or more tent meetings every year. It is pretty generally admitted that in the middle west, that there are three months in the year when our old line protestant churches are closed or nearly so. Some say they can not afford to get an evangelist. Let the pastor be his own evangelist. Then if pastor is one of those who is so busy he can not be his own evangelist, utilize our great army of local preachers. Some will say, it might divide the crowd. Well the fact is, if we do not give our people something to do, and do not push out, they will have no vision. Our local churches



must be made to see the condition around them Many a pastor serves a church from one to five years, and knows nothing about the masses in his city, or nothing about the scores of little towns around his church. This is all without excuse. We should go every where preaching the Word. It is a God's truth that our Assembly minutes

of many of our older established churches show that they are not making any progress. We must face the facts. Why are many of our Sunday schools half the size they were five, six, or eight years ago? There is generally only one reason for such a condition, that is, a pastor does not know his job. There are thousands of children around

Faith, prayer and works will place these four tents on these needy districts. Please, please, please join us in prayer for these needs. We must get the gospel to the people.

WHAT IS THE PRAYER AND FASTING LEAGUE?

By H. D. BROWN

THE Prayer and Fasting League is brought into life for the purpose of supplying spiritual, moral and financial support to the schools of the Church of the Nazarene. For years the question of money to support our schools has borne heavily upon our people. The absolute necessity of these schools is manifest to all. Infidelity and atheism have so permeated our public schools, in-cluding the state colleges and universities, that Christian parents do not feel safe in sending their children to these schools. So many have made shipwreck of their faith because of these schools that we are deeply impressed with the importance of our holiness church colleges. Our church has attempted to do something in the field of Christian education. God's people are learning that the spiritual part of education should be more specially emphasized and we have a goodly number of high grade schools which are doing a good work.

The tuition is not sufficient to meet the expenses of these schools. There are many expenses and in the aggregate they amount to a considerable sum of money. Various plans have been tried for raising this deficit. The plan of having money raising campaigns is not entirely satisfactory. Apparently the church and other people have become weary of the "drive" to raise money.

To raise the necessary funds to sustain our schools, the Prayer and Fasting League is presented to our church. The credit of planning and suggesting this league is due to Brother E. I. Ames, of Pasadena, Calif. He says it came to him like an inspiration from heaven, that great things might be done by a league of this kind. Brother Ames has recommended it to the Church and done all he could to make it effective. Briefly stated the league is as follows: Each member of the League is to take upon his heart the work of Christian education and pray for the success of our schools. When health and circumstances will permit, he is to fast at least one meal each week and specially pray for the success of our schools. The amount which can be saved by omitting one meal, he puts into the educational fund. If he can not fast one meal, by some other selfdenial he can make a small contribution each week to this fund for Christian education. This is a very small contribution to make, it is a very small effort in behalf of the great work of Christian education, yet if our church will adopt this plan and our entire membership faithfully co-operate in this work, it will solve the financial question for all our schools. It will pay off all our debts and furnish money to supplement the tuition and sustain our schools. This plan does not require a stipulated amount from each individual, but it does require a contribution each week. It supposes that every one will take a heart interest in our schools. It supposes that every one will earnestly pray for their success and practice self-denial in order to make the weekly contribution as much as it reasonably may be made. The General Board of Education has approved this Prayer and Fasting League. In the Southwest Educational District it is in operation and has several hundred members. We hope for great things from this league. The following is the pledge as provided by the chairman of the General Board of Education:

"I.....hereby subscribe to the Prayer and Fasting League and agree when health and circumstances permit, to fast one meal each week and to give the amount saved thereby to the cause of Christian education. I also agree to do my utmost to interest others in this worthy cause. It is understood that all money paid in will be administered through the General Board of Education of the Church of the Nazarene.

We invite a careful and prayerful consideration of this league of Prayer and Fasting for our schools. It has great possibilities and, if our preachers and people will give it the attention and effort which it deserves, the problem of financing our schools will be solved.

This league has the advantage of being a complete system. Systematic work is a great necessity. Sys-



tem is the solution of many hard questions. The wonderful system of ten cent stores, built up by Mr. F. W. Woolworth is an illustration of this fact. A few years ago Mr. Woolworth was the proprietor of a small store in New York, with only one clerk. He caught the vision of systematic work with small profits. He saw that small profits gathered from multitude of sales, would in the aggregate make very large profit. He reduced his business to a perfect system. He multiplied his stores and amassed a fortune. His sales are from five to fifteen cents each but his business amounts to many millions in one year. It is said that his sales last year, amounted to one hundred and forty-two millions, and his What this profits to more than thirty millions. man did in secular business, we can do in the work of the Lord. If we will be systematic in our work, pray much and give something every week, we can make a great success of our school work.

We need system in our church work. We especially need system in our school work. If we have a complete system and adhere tenaciously to it, we can do wonderful things in the Church of the Nazarene.

We trust that our entire church will adopt the Prayer and Fasting League. Let us faithfully, earnestly and continuously work for the greatest success in our Christian schools.
