Out-Of-Debt Campaign

On August 30, 1928 the Finance Committee of Northwest Educational Zone met at Pendleton. Oregon to consider the present status of the Campaign to liquidate the indebtedness of Northwest Nazarene College. The Treasurer's report was given which was very encouraging. It was found that together with the amount of cash held in trust and the concessions granted by the creditors of the institution and the amount that the business men of Nampa have agreed to raise that with \$12,000 more in cash we would be able to wipe out a debt of approximately \$85,000.

At the present time we have subscriptions covering this remaining \$12,000. If all the subscriptions are good we can actually free Northwest Nazarene College of debt. If you have an unpaid subscription please pay it at once if possible, in order that we may know exactly where we stand.

In order to bring the Campaign to a close the Finance Committee voted to set the date NOVEMBER 1, 1928 as the closing date of the Campaign. This action means that November 1 will settle whether or not we win or lose in this effort to free Northwest Nazarene College of debt.

Special music will be furnished by the College Male Quartet and others.

At the convention there will be several visiting pastors and evangelists, besides many other friends. We would extend a
