Rev. and Mrs. Ralph Cook, recently returned missionary from India, will be the speakers next week for the fifth annual Mangum missionary lectures.

Rev. and Mrs. Cook have served in India the past 12 years under the Church of the Nazarene; first at Buldana, Berar C. P. and later at Chikhli, Berar, Central Province.

In addition to evangelistic work on the field, Rev. Cook has supervised the construction of several buildings on the missionary compound.

Since returning to this country several weeks ago the Cooks have been traveling throughout the United States in deputation work for the department of foreign missions under the direction of Dr. Remiss Rehfeldt, Foreign Missions secretary.

The Mangum missionary series of lectures was set up by the children of Dr. and Mrs. T. E. Mangum in honor of their parents.

The series were inaugurated by Mrs. Louise Robinson Chapman of Africa. Other speakers have been Dr. Lauren Seaman from Africa, Rev. C. H. Wymans of Peru and Prescott Beals from India.

### Recent Ruling Will Permit College Youths to Select Branch of Service

Under a recent ruling by Secretary of Defense George S. Marshall, college students will be permitted to select their branch of service even though they may have already received their pre-induction notice or have taken their physical.

The new policy is designed to "prevent the waste to the nation and the damage to the educational system that is involved in having young men leave school in mid-term because they desire to enlist in the service of their choice before they are called for pre-induction physical examination by their local draft boards."

Under the old rules no armed service would accept voluntary enlistment after a man had received notice to report for his pre-induction examination. The new policy permits students enrolled in colleges and universities, and thus automatically deferred until the end of the school year, to enlist in the service of their choice at any time in the two months immediately preceding the final month of their school year.

As in the past, each service would accept enlistments only to the extent that places were open for those who desired to enlist.

Services accepting enlistments during this two-month period would not call the students to duty until they had finished their school year.

For NNC students this would mean that they must enlist between March 1 and April 30. They would then be called on or shortly after June 1.

General Marshall expressed the opinion that the new rules would prove of benefit to the students, the

colleges and the national defense effort. He emphasized the importance to the nation of maintaining a vigorous educational system and elimination of the unsettled conditions that have developed on many campuses as a result of large-scale enlistments by men who wanted to enlist before they received their Selective Service call.

### Debaters Plan Several Tournaments

Speech activity at NNC will step up considerably this semester with two and possibly three tournaments in line for NNC debaters.

According to Professor Wilson, NNC will participate in the Linfield tourney again this year. The Linfield tourney is a feature in the Northwest with this year marking the 21st annual tourney.

Second biggest tourney on the agenda will be the Idaho State tournament at Albion. This tourney will be an all-Idaho affair, featuring five colleges.

Funds permitting, the NNC speech department will also be represented at a Missoula, Montana tourney which will be held in early April. Schedule for this tourney has not yet been arranged.

Debate teams have not yet been finally appointed, but George Pfenniger and Melvin Palmquist will probably form one team with Clinton and Delmar Cook forming another. Both these teams debated capably during the last semester, Prof. Wilson asserted.

## Four Year B. A. Major for Secretaries To Be Offered By Expanding Bus. Dept.

For the first time in the history of NNC a regular four-year major will be offered along the secretarial line next year, according to plans released by the Business department.

The new plan will have a Business Administration major with general requirements which will branch out into four concentrated fields. They are Management, Accounting, Secretarial and Clerical.

The Business department has been expanded considerably during the past year by Prof. Hays Johnson and Mrs. Rose Voget.

In addition to the new fields which will be opened next year, several machines and new courses have been added in order to provide business students with a large field of selection.

The largest department in school, the business department, has a total enrollment of over 95 students. Included are 22 business majors, 8

of whom are seniors, and five secretarial certificates.

New machines added in the past year include a ditto machine or direct process duplicating machine, two electric adding and listing machines, one ten-key and one full keyboard, one manually operated adding machine and the latest dictaphone machine on the market.

New courses offered this semester for the first time are: Federal Tax and Specialized Accounting, by Prof. Johnson; Business Statistics, under Prof. D. B. Tillotson, and Business Machines, under Mrs. Voget.

Thirteen different courses are offered by the two instructors. These courses cover subjects which range throughout the business field.

Addition of the new B. A. major for secretaries will be another big step "towards providing NNC with the best and most complete business department in the West," Mrs. Voget asserted.

Skip Wilcox paced NNC in its surge and wound up with scoring honors for NNC with 17 points. W. Beukelman trailed him with 13.


Bell with 20 points and Harold Loveless, a former all-state performer who was recently added to the squad, bucketed 18 to pace the winners.

NNC's red-hot Crusaders presented Tip Off Queen Merilu Jensen with a victory on her coronation night as they blasted Northern Idaho 71-43 with a terrific surge in the last ten minutes.

They repeated their success the following night with a resounding 81-52 verdict over the Loggers.

In the first tilt Woody Beukelman flipped through 17 points, including seven out of seven free throw attempts, to pace the victors. Carlyle Dean caged 15 tallies and Merl Iles bucketed 11.

NNC opened to a quick 8-0 edge then watched it melt into a 19-16 deficit before Myron Finkbiener came through with a scoring spree to pace the Crusaders to a 26-22 half-time lead.

With ten minutes left and the Crusaders on top 41-33, the locals suddenly opened up with a fast break attack which left NICE gasping for points.

The second tilt was a reversal of the first in that the Crusaders took up where they had left off the night before fast breaking to a tremendous 46-21 halftime edge and then

coasting in the rest of the way.

## Antique Church To Be Restored

The oldest known grave in the church cemetery dates back in 1852 and it is believed the church was built sometime between that date and 1856.
